The Girl Scout office these days is gaily decorated with tinsel and red and green ornaments as befits the Christmas season, and is prepared to help troops make these ornaments and other gifts and home decorations. This will be one of the subjects under discussion at the subjects meeting to be held Monday evening at 7:30 in the Presbyterian church parlors, when there will be an exhibit of Christmas handicrafts, and patterns available for making them. 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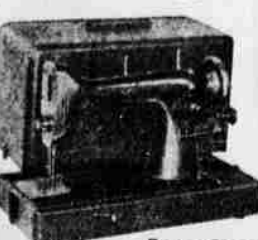
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
