

Law Officers Finish Confab

PORTLAND, Dec. 6 (AP)—After some pro and con talk on the amount of cooperation given by state police, Oregon sheriffs and district attorneys ended their annual conventions here yesterday.

Several district attorneys said law enforcement would be simpler if state police were then heard, but it all ended amicably as a resolution was passed unanimously commending the state police on the job they were doing.

The district attorneys recommended that counties provide them office space and stenographers. Several said they now have to pay rent out of their salaries.

The sheriffs elected C. L. McCauley, Deschutes county, president, and John B. McCourt, Multnomah county, secretary-treasurer.

Milk Strike Ruling Made

NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 6 (AP)—Federal Judge Ben C. Hawkins yesterday sentenced Leo B. Carter, representative of the International Teamsters' union (AFL) to one year in the federal penitentiary and to pay a fine of \$5,000 for violation of the anti-racketeering act during a milk strike last spring.

Of 59 men, most of them dairy farmers of the Amite, La., area, who pleaded guilty to the same charge earlier this week, only six were suspended sentences.

Other sentences ranged from prison terms of four months to a year.

The strike was staged in protest of prices paid for milk by New Orleans distributors.

Milk trains and trucks carrying milk to New Orleans were halted by armed strikers and the cargo was seized and poured out.

Physical Exam Enforcement Asked

PORTLAND, Dec. 6 (AP)—School officials should enforce rigidly the requirement of an annual physical examination for every school child.

So asserted Oregon's health education instructors at an annual meeting here yesterday.

They also recommended: A one-semester course in Oregon schools on health education, apart from physical education; a central clearing house be established for material on health education; more attention be given to training supervisors of elementary physical education teachers; towns wishing to promote recreation do so by taxation, perhaps at \$3 per capita.

Soldier Held For Army

Salvatore Pallante, 24-year-old soldier who already has one bad conduct discharge from the army, was given a 30-day holding jail sentence yesterday afternoon on a charge of having no operator's license and is to be turned over to army authorities in connection with a car theft and for AWOL.

Pallante was arrested here Thursday night in possession of a car belonging to Maj. John Hull, a car he was supposed to transport from Washington, D. C., to Denver, where the major is now stationed.

He admitted skipping Denver and taking a tour of the western states, winding up in Klamath Falls. Pallante said he was 20 days over leave.

When arrested Pallante was wearing civilian dress and carried a folder containing makeshift identification papers of the Virginia state police and the department of justice.

Pallante told officers he had been in the army five years and spent about 175 days in the guardhouse. He once received a bad conduct discharge and promptly re-enlisted.

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Indians Fight Dam Building

SPOKANE, Dec. 6 (AP)—Two groups of Yakima and Nez Perce Indians have gone into federal court in an effort to halt construction of the McNary dam across the Columbia river at Umatilla, Ore.

Suits filed yesterday asked the court to grant an injunction ordering the Guy F. Atkinson company to stop work on two government contracts let in connection with building of the dam.

The Indians contend the dam would cause irreparable damage to salmon runs and abrogate the treaty of 1855 granting the Yakima and Nez Perce tribes perpetual fishing rights in the Columbia river and its tributaries.

Plaintiffs in one suit are Alex Salukhin and 13 other Yakima Indians. They value the Yakimas' fishing rights at more than \$20,000,000. Plaintiffs in the second suit are Harrison Lott and nine other Nez Perce tribesmen, who claim the dam would deprive the Nez Perces of fishing rights worth \$10,000,000.

The two groups say they represent 6000 members of the Washington and Idaho tribes.

Churchill Hits Socialism

MANCHESTER, Eng., Dec. 6 (AP)—Winston Churchill said today that socialism will mean that 12,000,000 Britons "will have to disappear in one way or another."

The former prime minister, addressing 14,000 persons at a rally of the conservative party he leads, pictured Britain as "in peril to a degree which I have hardly ever known before."

"I am quite sure that socialism—that is to say, the substitution of

state control by officials instead of private enterprise—will make it impossible to 48,000,000 people to live in this island, and that at least one-quarter of all who are alive today will have to disappear in one way or another after enduring a lowering of standards of food and comfort inconceivable in the last 50 years.

"Emigration, even if practiced on a scale never before dreamed of, could not operate in time to prevent this melancholy decline."

REDONDO BEACH, Calif., Dec. 6 (AP)—Karl K. Keith, 71, collapsed and died in his home last night after listening to the Louis-Walcott fight on the radio. Police said they believed he died of a heart attack induced by excitement. He was pronounced dead a few minutes after the broadcast ended.
