

Lake Rotary To Sponsor City Trips

LAKEVIEW, Ore., Dec. 6—At least four Lake county boys and girls will go to San Francisco for three days the week of December 14 as guests of the Lakeview Rotary club, winners of a new lamb feeding contest which will end and be judged on December 13.

In this contest, members of the 4-H and Future Farmers of America bought lambs at cost through Rotary club to fatten for market along plans approved by the club. A total of 11 boys and girls have 185 lambs in the contest.

Purpose of the contest is to educate county youth and their parents in the value of feeding stock here before shipping to market, rather than in shipping both the feeders and the feed to other localities for fattening.

While the Rotary club started their project this year with lambs only, they expect to include beef also another year. As a reward to the entrants, the club will pay all expenses for two 4-H and two FFA winning members to the San Francisco market, and will pay transportation for any other entrants who wish to go.

At San Francisco, the group will first watch their stock sold at the stockyards, then will visit the packing plant to see it processed. The afternoon of Monday, December 15, they will be guests of the city and county of San Francisco on a sight-seeing tour, and at noon Tuesday they will be guests of the San Francisco Rotary club at luncheon.

Entered in the contest are Billy Waters, Ervin Molten, Terry Newman, Darwin Hammersley, Glen Hendbury and Donald Vincent of the Future Farmers, and Kathryn Holloway, Lillian Meaker, Anna May Fisher, Glen Cleland and Frank Houston of 4-H.

Unfit Teacher File Asked

PORTLAND, Dec. 6 (AP)—The Oregon Education association heard a suggestion yesterday that a file of unfit teachers be kept along with the state file of qualified teachers.

The proposal came from Mrs. Myrtle Lee, Baker county school superintendent, who said it would prevent unfit teachers from getting jobs after once being fired.

The group also learned of the resignation, effective next July, of Dr. Frank W. Parr, executive secretary. He will become assistant executive secretary of the California Education association.

The state school lands committee recommended that school districts be exempted from payment of the gasoline tax. He said school districts are the only political subdivisions now paying it.

J. W. Edwards, acting school superintendent at Portland, proposed removal of the property qualification for voting on school measures.

Lynn Gubser, Yamhill county superintendent, suggested that school funds be apportioned on the basis of days pupils attend school rather than on school census.

Snow Good At Crater

Snow and weather conditions at Crater Lake national park are right for good, fast skiing Sunday, park officials advised today.

There are 28 inches of snow at headquarters now and 31 at the rim with 10½ inches of powder snow that fell during the past week. Ski trails are in good condition with one or two inches of powder over the packed snow.

Maximum temperature Friday was 40 degrees and minimum 13 degrees and Saturday morning the weather was clear with a few scattered clouds and temperature stood at 15 degrees. The lunch counter was opened for this afternoon and will be open Sunday.

Ice and snow on roads within the park call for chains on cars and they should be carried in all motor vehicles, rangers insist.

Early Fishing Seasons Asked

LAKEVIEW, Dec. 6—Early opening to fishing of Drews creek and tributaries, Dry creek and tributaries, and Ana river will be recommended to the state game commission at its January meeting by the Lake County Sportsmen's association. It was voted Tuesday night.

The group suggests that these streams might be open April 10, with opening of the general fishing season from May 22 to October 15. They agreed on the same stream closures as 1946.

Three civil aeronautics board officials will conduct the investigation, seeking to learn cause of the Thanksgiving Day crash of the Columbia air cargo plane.

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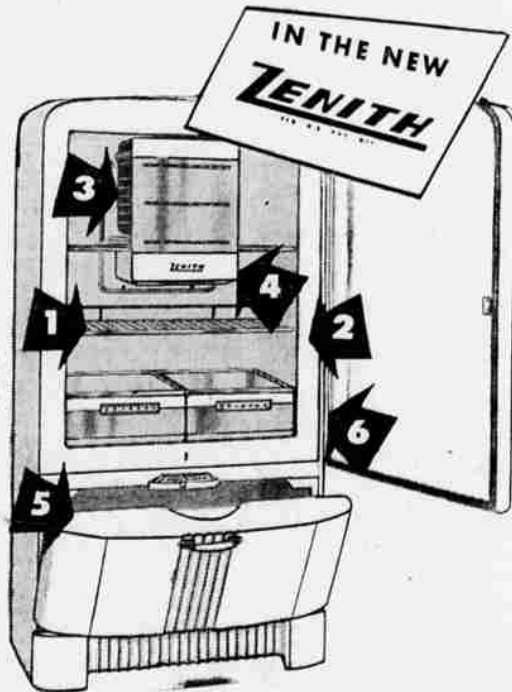

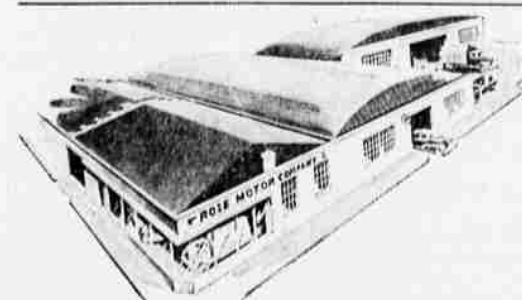
