Jake Bird Found Guilty

TACOMA, Dec. 6 (AP)—Jake Bird, 45-year-old transient who murdered two Tacoma women with an axe here October 30, today heard himself denounced by his own defense attorney as a man "who ought to hang" and then was sentenced to die at Walla Walla on January 16.

Superior Judge E. D. Hodge pronounced the sentence after denying a motion for a new trial and hearing J. W. Seiden, one of two defense attorneys, say he felt no sympathy for his client. Bird was convicted here November 26 for the slaying of Mrs. Bertha Kludt, her daughter, Beverly June, 17, was killed when she came to the defense of her mother.

"I feel," Seiden said, "that whenever any man 45 years old gets an idea that no lives are sacred to anyone, except his own, then that man is a detriment to society and should be obliterated."

"He did not consider the lives of two women. My associate (Arthur Paulsen) and I, according to our duty, have done everything to defend this man. He has had a fair trial by an impartial jury. At present my heart extends no sympathy to the defendant," the one-time Pierce county prosecuting attorney said.

Fruit Growers Convention On

WENATCHEE, Wash., Dec. 6 (AP)—The Washington State Horticultural association's 43rd annual convention went into its third day today with 1600 fruit growers from a dozen western states on hand for various sessions.

Delegates were told yesterday by Dr. E. J. Newcomer, federal entomologist at Yakima, that the most promise for control of pear psylla is offered by the two new chemicals, O-P-nitrophenyl thiophosphate and O-O-diethyl.

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Youth Nabbed For Car Theft

A 17-year-old Klamath Falls youth was being held in the county jail here today for Jackson county authorities, and his pal, an Ashland boy, was nursing a broken leg in the Ashland Community hospital while a charge hangs over his head. Both boys are said to be involved in car theft.

The Klamath boy, Stanley Mayfield, 516 High, was picked up here at 4:15 p. m. Friday by state police at the request of Jackson authorities. In the Ashland hospital is 18-year-old Paul Morris of 77 Manzanita, Ashland.

Officers said the two stole a 1937 coupe owned by Robert H. Wright of Ashland, at about 2 a. m. Friday and drove to a short distance over the Oregon-California line north of Yreka, when they hit a slick spot on the highway and wrecked the car. Morris suffered a broken leg in the accident and Mayfield injured an ankle.

The two fledged a car back to Ashland where they are said to have gone to the home of a girl friend. Morris then went to the hospital for treatment and Mayfield hopped a bus to Klamath Falls where officers greeted him on arrival. Mayfield remained in the county jail today but is expected to be moved to Medford this week-end. He is said to have had four stays in the state training school at Woodburn and was an escapee at the
