Truth Serum Test Fails

SEATTLE, Dec. 8 (AP)—Self-solicited "truth serum" tests in the case of Dell and Claire Richardson, who are serving life terms in prison for a Seattle "bathtub murder" case of a decade ago, appeared today to have left their case just about where it was before.

After the hour-long tests Friday night, Deputy Prosecutor James D. McCutcheon Jr. described them as "not conclusive."

Observers expressed the opinion that 10 years in prison tends to drop a fog over human memory, and McCutcheon confirmed the reaction with the comment: "Memory is the main obstacle; there are periods during which they cannot recall just what they did."

Mr. and Mrs. Richardson have insisted that the death of Clara Compton, 19, in their Seattle hotel room in 1937 was accidental and she had taken drugs, and they have sought the "truth serum" tests for a long time. At the time of the trial the prosecution contended that Miss Compton was beaten and then

scalded in a bathtub in an attempt to make her death appear accidental. "We will have no recommendations to make before a complete study is made of the recordings taken during the tests," said McCutcheon.

He added: "Their stories are still inconsistent. Each still blames the other, at least inferentially, and both versions couldn't be true." McCutcheon said that even under the "truth serum" influence Mrs. Richardson continued to refuse to tell her family name, as during her trial, thereby indicating that she was "resisting" the drug to some degree.

Win more little friends this year with less strain on your budget by making your own Christmas toys.

Use sewing-box scraps and patterns that chart every stitch of your way. This makes filling socks with your own clever handwork easy. What it adds up to when lists are completed are favorite animals which little guys go for, dolls which bring yelps of glee from little girls.

Odds and ends of fabric dug out of a basket will make and stuff an Aunt Jemima doll, for example. More sewing-box scraps will dress Auntie to the nines in her traditional costume. A fine specimen of a horse or a floppy-eared dog take no more material—and no more time than an evening.

Remnants of yarn will make crocheted dolls and good money-saving replicas of Toyland's animals. Yarn may even be unraveled from discarded knitter to feed the crochet hook that loops up a Polly Pigtail doll, twin rabbits, or a family of bears.

Wheat League Backs Dams

BAKER, Dec. 8 (AP)—Continued construction of Columbia river basin dams had the endorsement today of the Eastern Oregon Wheat League after final sessions of the annual convention here.

The organization voted, however, to take no stand on the controversial Oa. Bond dam on the Snake river, a project of the Idaho Power company.

Another resolution urged the Oregon congressional delegation to work for additional funds for Bonneville power administration.

In the first contested election of its 20-year history, Ralph McEwen Jr., Haines, was elected president at Saturday's closing session and Condon was named state of the 1948 meeting.

McEwen, former vice president and traditionally the choice for the presidency, was elected by a four vote margin after having nominated incumbent president, Marion Weatherford, Arlington, for re-election.

Other officers' vice president, Paulen Kaebber, Wasco; secretary-treasurer, C. D. Conrad, Baker county farm agent, re-elected; assistant secretary, Leroy Wright, Sherman county farm agent, re-elected.
