

# School Units Agree Over Boundaries

Committees set up to study boundaries of district No. 2 and the county have come to an agreement, it was announced at last night's meeting of both school boards, 1 and 2, and Attorney Wilson Wiley has been instructed to prepare descriptions and ballot titles for a proposed change. The matter will come up for vote at an early election. The boundary question has to do with children attending KUHS and other schools in the area.

Superintendent Arnold Gralapp advised board members that the state department has set new standards for elementary schools and established new goals for improvement in both instruction fields and involving physical plants. These standards in printed form were distributed to board members for detailed study.

It was announced that a supervisor of the state department will make the rounds of the state shortly, and a school will be evaluated against these standards which have been set up. If schools do not meet standards set by the state department, they are not eligible for state aid, Gralapp pointed out.

The old naval station gym being installed at Conger school was discussed by the boards and Superintendent Gralapp observed that when completed the facility will be able to handle the 6th and 7th grades now enrolled at Roosevelt school.

The boards heard a request from Bob Henderson, president of 20-30 club, asking for use of the KUHS auditorium for three plays which the club wishes to sponsor. The request was granted provided dates can be cleared.

## County Jail Loses Four

The county jail lost four prisoners over the week-end, all in a strictly legal manner.

Salvatore Pallante, alias Jim Bradley, 24-year-old soldier, was released to army authorities Saturday. Pallante was accused of stealing a car belonging to Maj. John Hall, which he was delivering from Washington, D. C. to Denver, and AWOL.

Also released to army authorities was Martin Joseph Hilbourne, AWOL from Fort Ord, Calif.

Stanley Mayfield, 17, of 516 High, was turned over to Medford officers for return there in connection with the theft of a car owned by Robert H. Wright of Ashland, which was wrecked. Another youth, Paul Morris of Ashland, was injured in the accident north of Yreka. He has been hospitalized at Ashland.

Mike Naume, 16, held as an escapee from the Washington state training school at Chehalis, was turned over to Washington authorities.

## Indians To Talk Timber

The Klamath Indian tribes will meet in general council Thursday at the Klamath Agency council hall for a discussion of timber and educational matters.

One of the matters which probably will be brought up before the council will be the attendance of Indian students at Klamath county schools, for which 30 cents a day per pupil is paid to the county.

Harold Ashley, superintendent of county schools, said that the general cost of education in his schools is over \$1 a day per pupil, and that the Klamaths would be asked to raise their payments for schooling.

These payments come from a gratuity fund appropriated by congress, and came under scrutiny of the senate investigating sub-committee during hearings here in August.

## Couple Get Life Terms For Murder

SANDPOINT, Idaho, Dec. 9 (AP)—A teen-aged feminine "Tarzan" and her former sailor-sweetheart were sentenced by District Judge E. V. Boughton Monday to life imprisonment in the Idaho state penitentiary in connection with the October 10 gag slaying of 18-year-old Juanita Lavonne Plaster.

The two—Verna Norton Keller, 17, and Roscoe Clark Hartley, 20-year-old former pharmacist's mate in the navy, had pleaded innocent to first degree murder in the death of the Plaster girl.

Today, they changed their pleas to guilty to second degree murder and waived the usual 48-hour delay between a guilty plea and sentencing. They had been scheduled to go on trial early in January.

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## Ike To Take Over Columbia In June

NEW YORK, Dec. 9 (AP)—General of the Army Dwight D. Eisenhower will assume the presidency of Columbia university next June 7, it was announced today by Frederick C. Coykendall, chairman of the university's trustees.

Coykendall said Eisenhower would come to New York about May 1 to take up residence in the president's house. The house has been occupied by Dr. Nicholas Murray Butler, president emeritus of Columbia, for whom funeral services were held today.

Eisenhower will not take over as head of Columbia until June 7, Coykendall added. He said he conferred with Eisenhower before they attended Dr. Butler's funeral services.

## Hunter Finds Plane Wreckage

MECHORD FIELD, Wash., Dec. 9 (AP)—Air rescue officials here reported Tuesday that CAA officials in Portland have notified them that the wreckage of a plane, possibly a C-45, had been found by a hunter six miles southwest of Meacham, Ore.

The report was received by CAA officials from Henry Davenport, of Silverton, Ore. A C-47 has been dispatched from Meachord with a ground search party of seven men and a jeep aboard.

Air rescue officials said they have no record of a missing C-45, a twin-motored type plane.
