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Crop Control Highlight Of Grange Meet

Highlight of the state grange officers school and conference held at Shasta View school Saturday was the agricultural conference presided over by State Master Morton Tompkins, assisted by Charles A. Henderson, county agent.

Points emphasized in this conference were the reduction of AAA subsidies, fertilization of soil, control of disease in basin spud crops, selection of the right grass seeds to increase dairying, proper planting and timing of grain to avoid killing frosts, planting of Hanchien barley in place of flax, planting of sugar beets in relation to freighting and markets.

Weed control and the use of cover crops were also brought up, and the grange passed a resolution to request better freight rates and the authorization to engage an attorney to work toward the reduction of these rates.

The lecturers conference will be held in Corvallis January 5 and 6. Langel Valley grange took both attendance awards at the conference, for having the greatest attendance and for having all officers present.
