

OSC Dropped By New York City College

Beavers Miss Foul Shots Often During 58 to 51 Decision

Holding their own from the floor but outshot from the foul line, Oregon State's defending Pacific Coast conference basketball title last night dropped a 58-51 decision to the City College of New York.

It was the West Coast five's first loss in six starts this year and gave them an even break in their eastern invasion. They defeated Canisius Saturday.

Long one-handed shots by Cliff Crandall and Ward Paldanius left OSC trailing 49-48 with but three minutes remaining, but the easterners ran off nine straight points to clinch the victory.

Crandall, only holdover from last year's title, topped the loser's scoring with 12, two less than City's Lionel Malamed.

OSC outshot City from the floor 30 to 18, but hit only 11 of 22 foul line attempts while the victors potted 22 of 34 tries.

The Oregon State loss leaves only Washington and Washington State undefeated among the Northwest's major colleges. Washington, soon to undertake a Mid-west invasion against Purdue, Minnesota and Ohio State, seeks its fourth straight win Friday as host to Western Washington college. Saturday the Huskies entertain College of Puget Sound.

Idaho's battling Vandals took a late game lead over Eastern Washington college last night at Cheney but dropped a 44-43 decision in the final 15 seconds when George Cabal's home run, Eastern forward, bucketed a foul toss (Gablehouse topped the scoring with 17).

Elsewhere in the night's activity, Montana university made its home debut a success with a 66-47 win over Pacific Lutheran; Western Washington handed Seattle college its third straight defeat 50-46; and Linfield fell before the Salem Page Woolens 62-47.

Salem Trundler In Star Rolling

CHICAGO, Dec. 10 (AP)—Don Wrotten of Salem, Ore., joined a select field of 46 bowlers today in the semi-finals of the seventh All-Star national individual match game bowling tournament.

The Oregon trundler posted a 24-game total of 4825 to finish third among the 46 pinmen qualifying for the semi-final round.

Tops among the 46 qualifiers was Stanley Slomewski of Newark, N. J., with 5121, a 24-game average of 213.

Portland Acquires Long Boy

The Vancouver Hornets continued to dominate the Pacific Coast pro cage circuit today with an unblemished slate, their 55-45 win over the Astoria Chinooks last night giving the Canadians a win over every team in the circuit.

And once again it was the marksmanship of Forward Norm Baker that carried the offensive load. Baker potted 27 points, 10 more than Hays, Astoria's leading scorer, and set the pace through a second half that saw Vancouver come back from a 21-19 halftime deficit.

The same two clubs tangled again tonight at Astoria. The second half of the league bill takes Tacoma to Seattle against the second place Athletics.

Meanwhile the defending Portland titlists continued to shuffle their playing squad in an attempt to quit the league cellar. Ois Anderson, Portland president, said a trio of cagers, signed from the defunct Basketball League of America in the East, includes Center Noble Jorgensen, whose 6 feet, 9 inches make him the league's tallest player, and two guards, Harry Root and Otto Kerber.

Guard Mel Good and Forward Frank Smith have been cut from the Indian squad to make way for the new acquisitions, Anderson said. A third player will be released soon.

Salmon Size Limits Set

PORTLAND, Dec. 10 (AP)—The Oregon fish commission has set a 27-inch limit on Chinook salmon taken on troll in Oregon waters and has banned sale of ocean-caught Chinooks under the limit.

It reported that protective measures for blueback salmon are under consideration.

The commission also prohibited troll fishing of silverside salmon in the November 16-June 30 period of all future years. The order is effective January 1.

Both measures were said necessary to conserve salmon runs.

Canadian Navy Works At Job

Cage Tourney Opens At Pel Gym Thursday

Nothing At Stake As Three Upstate Squads Face K-Men

A cage tournament with no winner and no loser is the plan for the 20-30 club's invitational basketball jamboree which opens here at Pel Gymnasium tomorrow night.

Three upstate squads will vie with the Klamath Pelicans in the tourney, but backers are quick to point out that the play will be strictly experimental for all teams concerned. Nothing is at stake.

The Grand Generals, coached by Mark Covert; the Astoria Fishermen, skippered by Ernie Stranz; and the Oregon City Pioneers, with Coach Ben Jones, are the visitors, and the three-day meet will formally open high school cage season here.

Two games will be played each night, starting at 7:30.

First pairings put the Pelicans against Astoria and Oregon City against Grant. The Generals will arrive a little late but in time for the nightcap.

Friday's pairings have Grant against Astoria and Klamath against Oregon City. Saturday night Oregon City and Astoria will have the first game, Klamath and Grant the finale.

The game tomorrow will be the third of the season for the Pelicans and first on the home hardwood. Coach Wayne Scott probably will not start a first string composed of Bob Barnes and Gary Diers, forwards; Jack Lust, center; Jack Kennett and Don Zarosinski, guards, on the floor.

Tickets for the three nights—six games—have been on sale at Cascade Mercantile and by 20-30 club members for \$2 and single night tickets at 75 cents will be marketed at the gymnasium gate.

Dr. Nardiello, Garden Physician Quits Boxing In Favor Of Medicine

The player had a dozen teeth knocked out and a gash in his upper lip which required 20 stitches to close. But he got back into the game. Dr. Nardiello is at his best between rounds of a fight. He only has a minute and has been known to stop the bleeding in a gash and put in five stitches while the wounded gladiator is waiting for the warning buzzer to sound.

And as his fingers are flying over an injury, he has to decide whether the fight is to continue. If the doc says quit, the fight is off.
