

Final Rehearsal Held In Annual School Yule Party

The annual Christmas presentation of the combined drama, music, art and manual arts departments of the high school, to be given on the evenings of Wednesday and Thursday, December 17 and 18, in the Klamath Union high school auditorium, is now going into the final week of rehearsal.

Dress rehearsal has been called for Monday night at which time the 300 participating will put on the finishing touches.

The stage crew, under the direction of Francis Scapple, has completed the sets which include 17 large flats and a ramp. The immense stage at the high school is used in its entirety. Members of the art classes, under the direction of

Robert Banister, supervisor of art, are handling the painting of the sets.

The chorus of 215 voices will be seated on the stage for the final section of the program. The high school orchestra, under the direction of John O'Connor, will present the first part of the program, playing "O My Soul," "Praise God the Father," arranged by Simes, and a "Christmas Fantasy," for orchestra by Sopkin.

Dramatic action, portrayed in the final part of the program, is provided by the drama classes under Mrs. B. B. Blomquist. The action will include pantomime and living pictures.

The Christmas concert is com-

plementary to the public and given as the annual gift of these departments to the townspeople of Klamath Falls.

Sand Removal Threatens Smelt

YACHTS, Dec. 10 (AP)—Removal of sand from beaches in this vicinity threatens the smelt run, the chamber of commerce will contend in a protest to the state highway commission.

The highway department has issued a permit for removal of 10,000 yards of sand yearly for three years. N. G. Mitchell, president of the Yachts water district, said that when sand was taken in large quantities from Yachts Rock State park the smelt run ended. Chamber members believe the same thing is likely to occur here if the sand is removed.

Angell Pleads Pension Up

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10 (AP)—Rep. Angell (R-Ore.) has asked the house whether America's old folks "should be permitted to suffer for the lack of the bare necessities of life" while the nation is considering sending \$597,000,000 to Europe for interim aid.

America has never failed to answer Europe's plea for aid, he said, but congress has been dilatory in not acting on measures for relief of the aged in this country, such as his old age pension bill.

He said in a statement in the Congressional Record: "Hundreds of thousands of elderly men and women of America, who made America what it is, and whose

loyalty and industry have placed our country at the forefront of the nations of the world, are now in dire need of the bare necessities of life, food, clothing, shelter and medicines."

Angell said his bill to give larger payments to the aged now is held in a house committee and urged that members sign the discharge petition to bring it before the house.

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Super Black Markets Predicted

CHICAGO, Dec. 10 (AP)—The American meat institute said Tuesday restoration of meat rationing would produce "super-black markets."

"Controls on meat would drive the available supply out of legitimate trade channels, just as it did before, and into the hands of people willing to violate the law; with prices higher than ever and under which many families would be able to get little, if any, meat," a statement by the organization said.

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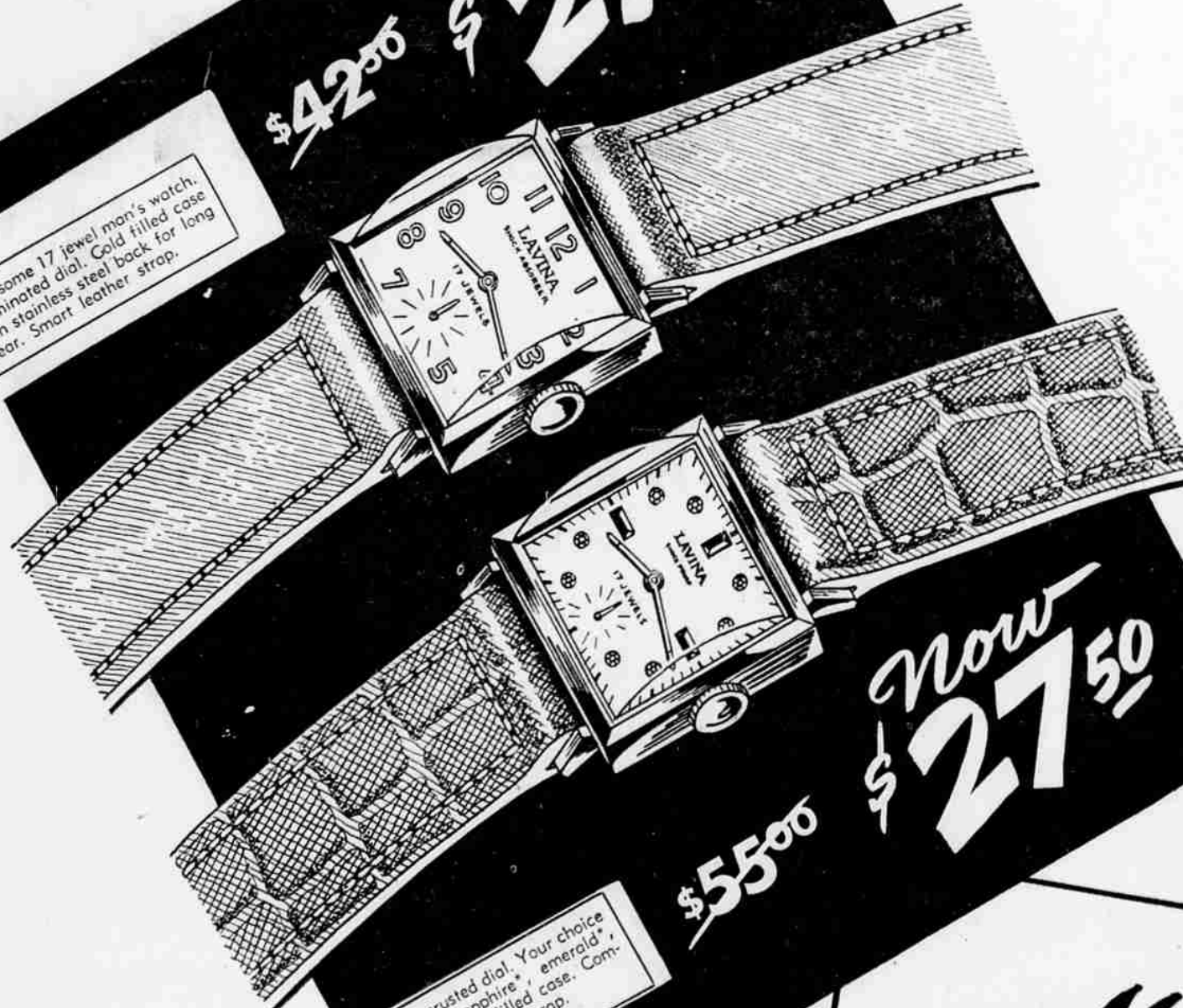
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
