

8000 Yule Trees Sold To Date

Lake and Klamath county Christmas trees will again grace many California living rooms this Christmas judging by the trees that have been sold from the Fremont national forest.

More than 8000 Christmas trees from the forest have already been sold to California dealers and are on their way to southern markets. This does not equal last year's sales which approximated 14,000 trees. All of the trees sold this year were white fir and were cut from all of the ranger districts.

Cutting of these small trees from heavy stands of young white fir results in desirable thinnings in many cases, according to the local forest officers. No cutting is permitted along highways or main forest roads or around recreation areas. Only a small proportion of the trees in the forest are suitably shaped for Christmas trees and thus the cutting does not result in denuding any area.

The demand for Christmas trees is continuing to increase and undoubtedly the cutting would be larger if it were not for the severe weather conditions and the poor roads that prevail at the time when this cutting is done. Usually the Christmas tree cutters start their work early in November and complete their operations by about the 10th of December.

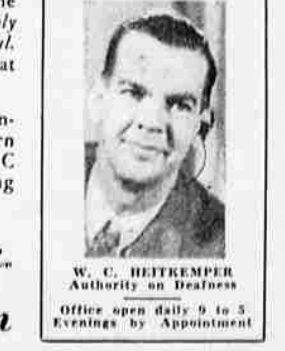
