Legations Explain Worker Arrests

WAPSAW, Dec. 11 (AP)—The envoys of three nations called upon the Polish government Wednesday to explain the arrests of three of their employees as gradual restrictions of privileges, especially of Anglo-Saxons, appeared to gain headway.

U. S. Ambassador Stanton Griffiths said he was making representations to the government on the arrest Saturday of Miss Zofia Michalowska, 36, who has been employed as clerk in American consulates in Warsaw and Krakow.

Belgian Minister Harold Eeman and the Swedish charge d'affaires demanded reasons for the detention of two of their employees.

Charges against the three were not immediately disclosed.

Farm Surplus Use Urged

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11 (AP)—Legislation to require the use in the foreign relief program of surplus agricultural commodities purchased by the government was offered in the house today.

Rep. Anderson (R-Calif.) introduced the proposal and said it has the support of house members from California, Texas, Florida and Arizona.

The plan would require such government agencies as the commodity credit corporation, which has bought large quantities of dried and frozen eggs, prunes, raisins and potatoes, to sell those commodities for foreign relief at prices fixed on a caloric content basis to equal the current market price of wheat.

Mandatory in its provisions, the amendment to the foreign aid bill would apply both to foods already purchased by the commodity credit corporation and those, such as citrus fruits, purchased later under price support programs.

Since dried and citrus fruits, eggs and other surplus commodities on hand normally sell for a higher

price per calory than wheat, the commodity credit corporation estimated that it would lose \$30,000,000 if it disposed of all its present price-support food inventories at the caloric price of wheat.

Senator-Teacher Meet At Last

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11 (AP)—Teacher and pupil met on Capitol Hill this week for the first time in nearly 25 years.

They were Senator Morse (R-Ore.), the pupil, and Christian P. Norgard, Washington representative of the American Humane association, the teacher.

Both recalled that Morse had been a member of Norgard's Sunday school class at the Baptist church of Madison, Wis. prior to 1923, when Norgard left Madison to move to New York state.

Norgard, who testified before a senate armed services subcommittee headed by Morse, said this was the first time he had seen the senator since he had taught him in Bible class.

More snow fell over scattered sections of the country today and temperatures in some parts of the Midwest again dipped below zero.

The snow areas today included the Eastern Great Lakes region and into New England and New York state; parts of North Dakota and

Minnesota and the Pacific Northwest. Rain was reported along the Gulf coast and fair weather over the Central and Southern Rockies westward and in most of the central plains states.

The coldest weather again was centered in North Dakota and Minnesota. The lowest early morning temperature, six below, was reported at Grand Forks, N. D., while Minneapolis' low was -3. Ten below was forecast for Northeastern North Dakota tonight. Temperatures in the eastern snow belt area were around freezing.

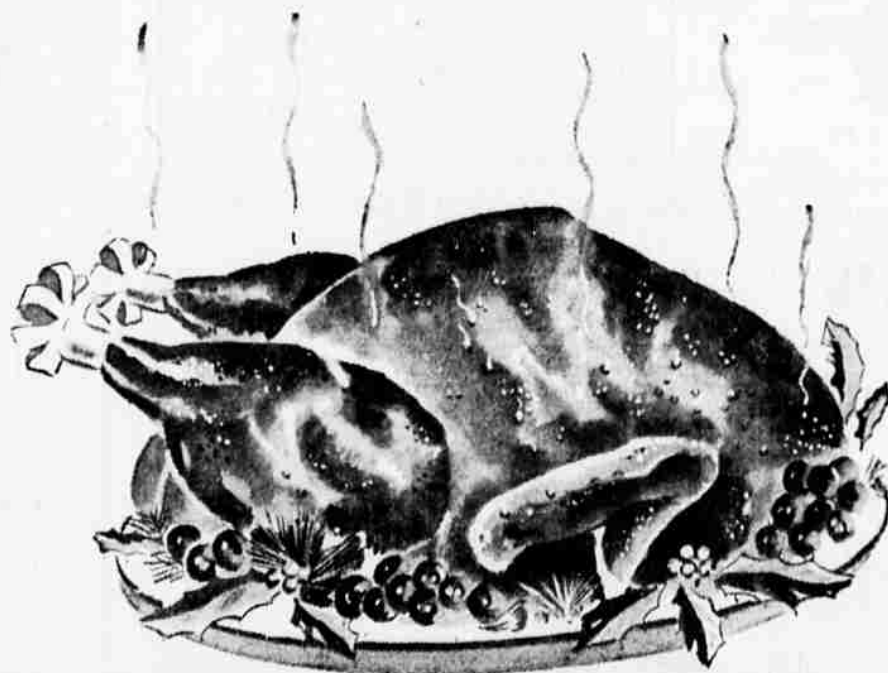
