Power Use Sets Record

PORTLAND, Dec. 11 (AP) — Electric power consumption in the public-private pool of Washington and Oregon touched a new record peak this week, the Bonneville power administration reported today.

Demand hit an all-time high on Monday at 6:30 p. m. when the pooled system was being drained of 2,792,000 kilowatts and on Tuesday the output was 2,749,000 at the same hour.

John Wheeler, BPA spokesman, said Tuesday's all-day output of 32,223,000 kilowatts was the highest in the region's history and came at a time when 63,000 kilowatts were being imported from Montana.

The importation of power is to help maintain a reserve of 91,000 kilowatts, and BPA said that without the reserve the two-state reserve supply would have been down to 28,000 kilowatts.

In Portland, demand this week saw three successive peaks for the Portland General Electric company's system, reaching 362,000 kilowatts Monday and Tuesday, 368,000 kilowatts yesterday. PGE officials reported all steam generating facilities are operating, but not at full capacity.

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Vet Buried At Arlington

Another Klamath veteran was brought home to rest, when the body of 1st Lt. Robert R. Bunnell, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. B. Bunnell of Sandy, Ore., formerly of Klamath Falls, was interred in Arlington national cemetery, Washington, D. C., on December 4.

Lt. Bunnell, who attended school at Henley and was a graduate of Klamath Union high school, is a nephew of Robert Ross, 2132 Thrall.

The army lieutenant was killed in action October 6, 1944, while serving with the 9th division's 60th infantry in Germany. His body was removed recently from a temporary cemetery in Belgium. Lt. Bunnell was born in Trinidad, Colo. March 13, 1920. He came to Klamath Falls with his parents at the age of 14. On his graduation from KUHS he was winner of a college scholarship and he was a 1942 honor graduate of Oregon State college where he held the highest ROTC cadet office. He was commissioned in May, 1942, and was sent overseas in September, 1944. He married Maebelle Clemons of Athena, Ore. in 1942. His bride was a great-granddaughter of Mark Twain. They had one child, a boy, born six months after his father was sent overseas.

Mr. and Mrs. Bunnell operated Bunnell's grocery at Hager. They sold their business at Hager in 1938 and moved to Summit, near Corvallis, where they had a grocery store. Recently they sold their variety store in Sandy.

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
