

Camp Beale Sale Slated

Fire Danger Pointed Out

Fire Chief Keith K. Ambrose today issued a warning for caution in use of decorations for Christmas.

Of particular danger, he said, are candles or any type of open flame light, especially on Christmas trees. The tree should be placed well away from fireplaces or stoves. Two or three days after it has been cut the tree becomes highly inflammable, although it still looks green. Parents should warn children about care with decorations and keep candles or anything of danger out of their reach. After Christmas, the fire chief urged, the tree should be removed since in several days it has become tinder dry.

Arabs Escape Jerusalem Jail

JERUSALEM, Dec. 11 (AP)—Eighteen Arab convicts in Acre prison escaped Wednesday while Arabs of the town of Acre engaged prison guards with gunfire, it was announced officially.

A press release said the Arab prisoners, separated from Jewish inmates after fights following the announcement of the United Nations vote to partition Palestine, had overpowered and bound the warden. The gunfire of Acre Arabs covered their flight, it said.

All Jewish prisoners of Acre, numbering about 80, had been transferred to the Jerusalem central prison.

Union Wins Test Case

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11 (AP)—In the first test of its kind under the Taft-Hartley law, a union which submitted non-communist affidavits required by the act has won bargaining rights formerly held by a union which refused to comply.

The national labor relations board announced Wednesday that 33 of 35 production workers employed by Sigmund Cohn Manufacturing company in New York voted November 17 for the International Association of Machinists as their bargaining representative.

The machinists' union, an independent, was the first major labor organization to meet Taft-Hartley law requirements and qualify to use NLRB services.

The CIO Wholesale and Warehouse workers previously had represented the WPRLers but the NLRB, in a precedent-establishing decision a month ago, refused to permit that union to appear on the ballot.

Ike For President Rumors Growing

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11 (AP)—An announcement that Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower will take over the presidency of Columbia university June 7 touched off speculation today that he may spend part of the intervening months looking over his presidential possibilities.

Politicians here expect him to surrender his army chief of staff duties to Gen. Omar Bradley about February 1, although army officials said it might be closer to March 1. In any event, he is expected to take a 60-day vacation before going to Columbia.

This would give him time, if he desires, to make up his mind whether to go along with the "Eisenhower-for-president" movement. Some of his friends have been urging him to seek the republican presidential nomination and this drive has taken formal shape under the national Draft Eisenhower league.

Horse Cases Filed Here

A horse fight between a Shetland stallion and a registered Palomino gelding is the basis of a lawsuit filed with the circuit clerk today, the suit brought by J. E. Newman against John Quigley, neighbors in the southeast suburban district.

Quigley was owner of the Shetland, Newman the Palomino. Newman charges that on April 26 the stallion broke out of his pen and got into the pasture where Bombardier, Newman's registered show horse, was kept, and that the Shetland attacked the gelding, biting and kicking until Bombardier was run into a wire fence and injured.

The suit is for \$46.50 for a feed bill while Bombardier was in the care of a veterinarian, a \$40 veterinary bill and \$125.00 for the loss of Bombardier as a show horse.

Newman said he valued Bombardier at \$225.00. He is represented by Attorney J. C. O'Neill.

A second lawsuit involving a horse is on file at the courthouse.

1 1/2 cup Pet Milk
2 1/2 cup cranberries
2 1/2 tablespoons water
2 1/2 tablespoons salad oil
1 1/2 tablespoons lemon juice
1 1/2 teaspoon salt

Chill milk until icy cold. Wash cranberries, dry on towel, then put through medium knife of food chopper. Add sugar, salt and water. Boil 3 min., stirring frequently. Chill thoroughly. Stir in salad oil. Whip chilled milk with cold rotary beater, or electric beater at high speed, until light and fluffy. Add lemon juice. Continue whipping until stiff. Fold into cranberry mixture. Serve on fruit salads. Makes 1 1/4 cups.
