

New Labor Law Probe Proposed

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12 (AP)—The house labor committee called on the justice department today for prosecution of "offenses in violation of the Lea act," which was designed to restrict the activities of James C. Pettillo's American Federation of Musicians.

In a report criticizing what it called Pettillo's "tyrannical power," the committee recommended also:

1. Consideration by the justice department of whether "the monopolistic practices of James Caesar Pettillo and the American Federation of Musicians are subject to prosecution" under the Sherman anti-trust act.

2. That the Taft-Hartley labor law be amended "so that monopolistic practices by labor unions which are injurious to the public interest shall be forbidden." The committee did not specify how the act should be amended.

3. That if it be made illegal for a union to "license an employer to do business."

4. That persons or firms put on unions "unfair" lists be given the right of redress in federal courts.

5. That officers of unions be prohibited from calling strikes or work stoppages, such as Pettillo has threatened in the recording industry on December 31, 1947, until after an election and an affirmative vote of at least a majority of the employees in a plant or an industry.

6. That safeguards be provided "to prevent a union and an employer from conspiring to evade" the Taft-Hartley act, and to allow recovery of damages by workers deprived of their jobs by such illegal acts.

Power Lack Said Coming

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 12 (AP)—If the clock runs slow or the lights seem dim, blame it on the power shortage.

The Bonneville administration said today the power supply is being cut so thin that it may be necessary soon to have a kilowatt here and a volt there to get by.

This would make the electric clock run slow in the peak hours of power use, but S. E. Schultz, chief Bonneville engineer, said the power could be turned up in early morning slack hours to let the clock catch up. He warned that any power failures this winter may wipe out the Oregon-Washington power reserve, which dwindled to 91,000 kilowatts Tuesday. He said demand is expected to increase another 50,000 to 60,000 kilowatts by Christmas.

1. To abolish the communist party in the United States.

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Actress Faces Charge Of Kidnaping And Assault

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 12 (AP)—Film Actress Madge Meredith, convicted of three felonies, awaits sentencing Monday on charges of kidnaping and assaulting her former career adviser, Nick Gianacchi.

A superior court jury of 11 women and one man returned the verdict late yesterday after 4½ hours deliberation. Besides kidnaping and assault, it convicted her of conspiracy and found three men co-defendants guilty of various charges after the four week trial.

They are Albert Tucker, 29, a nurseman, convicted of kidnaping, assault with a deadly weapon, and conspiracy; Danuta Kloukberg, 32, a cook, assault, conspiracy and possession of a blackjack; James Hatfield, 33, former Beverly Hills policeman, possession of a blackjack.

Penalties prescribed under California law are five years to life for conspiracy; one to 25 for kidnaping; five to 10 years for assault with a deadly weapon, and one to five for possession of a deadly weapon.

Miss Meredith, 26-year-old Iowa Falls, Ia., girl whose real name is Marjorie Masow and whose career progressed swiftly from a Hollywood delicatessen counter to stardom in two pictures, had this to say:

"Well, no matter what my sentence may be, I am no worse off than I was before, under the influence of that dominating Greek."
