River Fishing Fight Looms

ASTORIA, Dec. 12 (AP)—Initiative proposals today began to shape up into a fight between upper and lower Columbia river fishing interests with night fishing and fixed seining gear the targets.

The local fishermen's union decided to sponsor an initiative measure which would outlaw fixed seines—which are used on the upper river. Following that, William J. Seufert, cannery operator at The Dalles, who receives fish caught with fixed gear, proposed an initiative to ban night fishing. Most gillnetting here is done at night.

James H. Cellars, Astoria packer spokesman, said the night fishing ban would threaten an end to gill-net fishing here and suggested the best solution would be for both groups to drop their initiative proposals.

Union spokesmen here, however, said it was unlikely they would abandon efforts to halt use of fixed gear.

Farm Lands Go On Block

World War II veterans interested in the purchase of surplus farm lands as now advertised in the former Camp Adair project near Corvallis have until December 31 to make such declaration in writing. Project Manager Thomas F. Whitman informed the state department of veterans' affairs today.

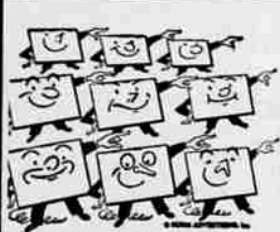
Veterans have priority, after December 31, on the remainder of 24,000 acres of land presently being offered former owners and tenants.

Those interested should write the project manager, box 622, Corvallis. They should give their full name and address, state that they claim priority rights as veterans "for purchase of lands as advertised October 2 and October 16, 1947," and request to be notified when information on the property is available so they may have an opportunity to make offer to purchase.

Within 60 or 90 days following the first of the year, these veterans will receive their notices. The project office at that time will be ready to conduct inspection tours of the lands, Whitman said.

The land will be sold to veterans at a fixed price. Where more than one offer is submitted on any piece of property a drawing will be held to determine the successful purchaser. Veterans' notices will inform them that they must submit 10 percent of the sale price, along with their offer.

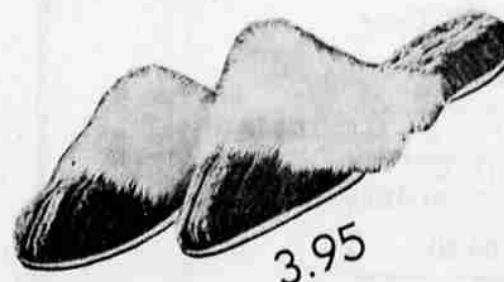
