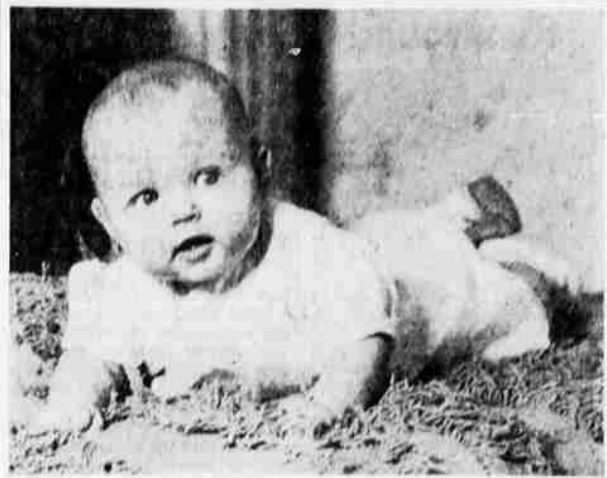
Hostess

Rotary Hears Tax Talk

Speaking on "Oregon's New Community Property Tax" at Rotary's luncheon speaker at the regular weekly meeting at the Willard hotel, Don McKay, of the trust department of the U. S. National Bank of Portland, stated that the average family earning \$4000 or less annually would not save a dollar on tax payments under the new law.

"Families whose annual earnings amount to \$5000 can save \$38 in tax payments under some circumstances," he said, "and \$10,000 annual incomes can be spared as much as \$439 in tax payments in some cases."

The Oregon law now affects only the families whose annual incomes fall into the higher brackets, according to McKay, and there is serious doubt in the minds of many of the state's best attorneys that it is constitutional. "It may stand as valid in Oregon for the duration of its first operative year," McKay said.
