

Federal Aid Proposed To Double College Enrollment By 1960 Proposed Today

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15 (AP)—Federal financial help to double college enrollments by 1960 was proposed today by President Truman's commission on higher education.

Adding a denunciation of minority "quota systems" and racial segregation in schooling to its first report, the 28-member body said the United States not only faces shortages in doctors, teachers and others but stands in peril for fostering an "intellectual elite."

Mr. Truman released the 103-page document with a statement urging that all citizens "examine it carefully."

Ten Officers Up To Admiral

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15 (AP)—Promotion of 10 navy staff corps officers to rear admiral for temporary service has been approved by President Truman.

The navy announcement said three of the officers are now serving as rear admirals as a result of duty assignments, and others will assume that rank as vacancies occur.

boys and girls," the report said, "the kind and amount of education they may hope to attain depends, not on their abilities, but on the family or community into which they happen to be born or, worse still, on the color of their skin or the religion of their parents."

Quota System Hit
The report criticized the "quota system" for admission by which it said many universities deny learning to "certain minorities, particularly to negroes and Jews."

"This practice is a violation of a major American principle and is contributing to the growing tension in one of the most crucial areas of our democracy," said the commission headed by George F. Zook, president of the American council on education.

The report asserted that despite laws guaranteeing equal advantages, inferior education is given to negroes in the 17 states and the District of Columbia where segregation is practiced.

To perpetuate a system in which the "underprivileged areas and families" supply most of the children, without assuring them full educational opportunity, is "sure to prove disastrous to the level of our culture and to the whole fabric of our democratic institutions," the document contended.

Today's report said that education for freedom, democracy, and world peace should become part of every phase of college life, including the school administration and outside activities, rather than be confined to a few courses or departments.

And as for the number of students, the commission said college attendance should be boosted to "a minimum of 4,600,000" by 1960, compared with 2,340,000 this year.

A much greater increase, in proportion, was urged for professional and graduate schools. They should enroll 600,000, the commission said, instead of the present 175,000, to reflect "the increasing need of the nation" for such training.

Governors Ask More Power Funds

PORTLAND, Dec. 15 (AP)—Western governors were on record today as demanding more money for power and water projects as a base for expanding western industry.

The governors' conference closed here Saturday with a resolution asking congress for supplemental power and reclamation appropriations immediately, and for regular appropriations large enough to develop projects systematically.

Such projects "could revise the whole industrial development of the entire west," declared Utah Governor Herbert B. Maw. Washington and California governors reported a serious power shortage in coastal states.

The governors also passed resolutions asking:

Restoration of coast guard service in Alaska.

Anti-tuberculosis measures in Alaska by the public health service, army and navy.

A foot-and-mouth disease research program to prevent the disease from spreading from Mexico into this country.

An investigation of western freight rates by the interstate commerce commission.

A geologic survey of the west's water resources.

The next meeting was set for California in April, the exact date and site to be decided later.

Homestead Rule Hit

YREKA, Dec. 15—Bureau of reclamation of the U. S. department of the interior is the target of a resolution passed by the Yreka post of the Veterans of Foreign Wars Monday night.

Commander W. D. Houston said his group contends that the appointment of a three-man examining board from the immediate Klamath basin area to handle the allocation of homesteads in the Tulelake vicinity had not kept good faith with the organizations and individuals represented at a meeting in Klamath Falls in May, 1946.

Houston said that, under a plan formulated with the bureau of reclamation to insure satisfaction and a fair allocation of public domain at Tulelake, the examining boards were to be composed of five members with representation from outside that immediate area.

The VFW stated that the plan had been adopted and used throughout the U. S. this year in the allocation of homesteads, but the bureau of reclamation now has set up a

Finnish Debt Proposal Made

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15 (AP)—U. S. Senator H. Alexander Smith (R-N.J.) said he would introduce a joint resolution today providing that further payments by the Republic of Finland on its World War I debt be used for the education of Finnish youth in the United States "to fit them for assisting in rebuilding of their country."

Smith, in a prepared statement, said the bill would provide for a special fund to be set aside for this purpose.

He declared that he was being joined in presenting the proposal by Senators Fulbright, Saltenstall, Bricker, Knowland, Hatch, Lodge, Thomas of Utah, O'Mahoney and Hill.

Police said a passenger, Joseph Gebhardt, 33, was only shaken in the crash late yesterday.

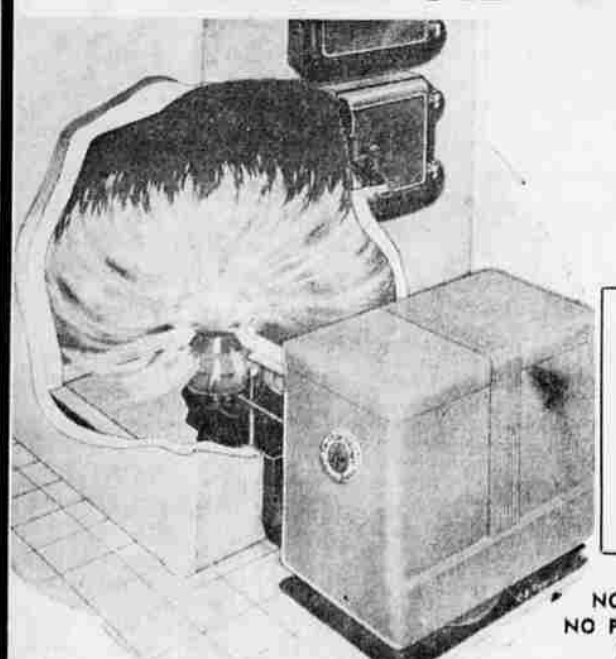
Gebhardt was quoted as having no explanation for the mishap but had sensed the impending crash and turned off the motor ignition switch to prevent fire.

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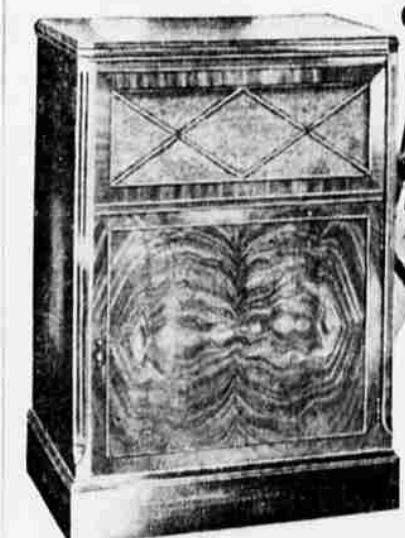
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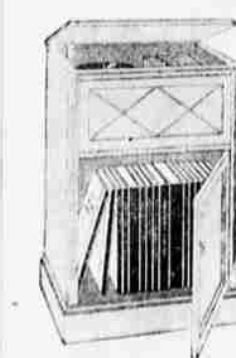
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
