

Traffic Survey Touches Off Row In City Council

The suggested north entrance route and a city-wide general survey came in for their weekly round of battering last night as city councilmen squared off to assert their feelings on the subjects.

It all started when Councilman Paul O. Landry pointed out that a California firm had contacted him Monday afternoon by telephone asking whether they should send a representative here in time for the council meeting to discuss the survey. The general survey of traffic, lighting, recreation and other conditions, was suggested last week by the Greater Klamath Falls association. It was offered as possibly supplying an answer to discussion of a means of routing highway traffic through town when the north entrance project is built, as well as helping with plans for other civic improvements.

Not Ready

Landry said he told the survey firm that the city and the Klamath County chamber of commerce and other interested groups are not yet ready to discuss concrete plans for the survey, since, among other things, no money has been obtained to finance the project.

The chamber of commerce is expected to discuss the plan at its Wednesday meeting. Councilman A. F. Condry demanded to know why the firm's representative should not be called in, saying that "you have to see what you're going to buy before you buy it."

City Engineer E. A. Thomas pointed out that the state is conducting an intensive survey of traffic conditions and problems in cities in Oregon and new light may be shed on the north entrance project through that survey.

E. M. Igl, chairman of the city planning commission, was in the audience and asked whether the council felt that the commission should consider plans on the over-all survey and how it would tie in with the state's check-up on traffic, but his question was lost in the heated discussion which followed.

Condry, stating that the over-all

survey should definitely be done, came back to the matter of having a man come up from California to talk to local groups this Wednesday at the chamber luncheon.

Speaking to Igl, Condry said, "I am not a building man or a zoning man, and I don't think you know any more about it than I do."

Mayor Ed Ostendorf pointed out that Igl has been chairman of the planning commission for three or four years, and Condry replied, "I've studied too, and I don't know anything about it."

Plans Laid

Landry argued that a professional surveying firm should be called in after more definite plans are lined up, particularly regarding means of financing the project.

Condry responded that there is a means of financing the survey, but Landry heatedly replied that "if there is, I know nothing about it."

"They don't want to tell Landry anything about it because they're afraid he'll throw a monkey wrench in the works," Condry retorted, "I won't stand for this polite way of pigeon-holing." (Condry did not enlarge on the term "they.")

Councilman Wendell Smith said he thought it might be a good idea to call in an outsider, and Councilman Angus Newton replied wryly,

He did not leave a will. The widow, Elaine P. Fox, was appointed administratrix of the estate and U. S. Balentine, brother-in-law of Fox, was the petitioner.

Also on file at the courthouse today is the estate of Sarah Anne Homering, who died intestate, December 3. The estate is estimated at \$1500 personal property. A daughter, Mrs. Viola Buck, was appointed administratrix.

Relatives Of Bradburn Sought

Medford authorities were seeking relatives of Loyd Bradburn, 42, found dead on a downtown street in Medford Saturday at 7:35 a. m. Bradburn is thought to have two brothers in Klamath Falls, and a sister and father in Dorris, Calif.

Bradburn was described as a veteran of World War II, blue eyes, brown hair and weighing about 120 pounds. He had been working in a Medford cafe for the past four months. His birthdate was given as March 10, 1905, at Wetumka, Okla. The body is at the Conger-Morris Funeral home in Medford and relatives are asked to contact Coroner H. W. Conger, Jackson county coroner at Medford.
