

Wedemeyer Urges Aid For China

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17 (AP)—General Albert E. Wedemeyer said today it is "urgent" that this country give aid to China to help Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek combat communism.

Wedemeyer testified before the senate appropriations committee. The group is considering whether China should be helped as part of the foreign aid program.

Wedemeyer made an inspection tour in China last summer as a special envoy of President Truman.

Kept Promises
He told the senate committee Chiang has "lived over backward" to keep his promises to the United States while the American government has broken those made to him.

Wedemeyer declined under committee questioning to disclose the contents of the report he made after his China tour. He said he reported his findings to the state department, but that they will not be released.

As a soldier, my commander-in-chief has directed me to maintain security on that report," he testified. "I would be embarrassed if the committee asked me to reveal the contents of my report without the authority of the president or the secretary of state."

Without mentioning Russia by name, the general said the United States is "confronted with the question of an ideology throughout the world."
Our aim, he continued, should be "to retard, then to block, and then to penetrate back into those areas which have come under the orbit and influence of a power that has world power, and world expansion in its program."

Phillies Obtain Power Hitter

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 17 (AP)—The Philadelphia Phillies have purchased power hitter Roy Cullenbine from the Detroit Tigers in a second move to revamp the club that finished tied for seventh place in the National league last season.
The purchase of Cullenbine yesterday for a reported \$20,000 followed the trade of Tommy Hughes for Bert Haas, of the Cincinnati Reds. Haas is a third baseman and outfielder and also has played first base.

Rose Bowl Cards Alloted Veterans

PASADENA, Calif., Dec. 17 (AP)—Public sale of Rose Bowl tickets has dwindled to about 6500 copies.
Southern California announced yesterday it was setting aside 1000 tickets for hospitalized servicemen in this area. The tournament of roses committee also has allocated a block of tickets for veterans, it was said.

Olympic Cycling Trial At Tacoma

SEATTLE, Dec. 17 (AP)—Definite scheduling of the national trials for the U. S. Olympic games cycling team at Tacoma next June was disclosed today by Roscoe (Torchy) Torrance, Olympics committee chief for this area, upon his return from the national meetings in the East.
Torrance said winners of the annual Northwest Golden Gloves tourney here February 23-24 probably will enter the national Olympic semifinals or finals, and the Northwest qualifying for the national basketball finals may be run off at the University of Washington pavilion.

Gen. Groves Promoted

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17 (AP)—Major Gen. Leslie R. Groves, who heads the military's atomic activities, was promoted by President Truman today for the three-star rank of lieutenant general.

Mr. Truman sent Groves' promotion to the senate for its approval. Groves, who supervised the original atom bomb project as chief of the former Manhattan engineer district, now holds two important posts in the atomic energy set-up.

He is a member of the military liaison committee of the atomic energy commission—the group which gives the uniformed services their contact with the all-civilian commission and head of the armed forces special weapons project. This latter organization is cloaked in secrecy but is known to include nuclear fusion in its studies and research.
Groves, now 51, was a brigadier general when the late president Roosevelt designated him to take over direction of the A-bomb project in 1942. He was promoted to two-star rank at about the time of the first test blast in 1945.

Christmas Ship Heads For Tokyo

TOKYO, Dec. 17 (AP)—It appears that Christmas in Japan and Korea this year will be a bang-up affair—a least for occupation troops and American civilian personnel.
American authorities announced today 200 tons of Yuletide packages would arrive aboard the S. S. General Meigs December 22—just in time for distribution by a khaki-clad Santa Claus. Packages for Korea will be forwarded from the port of Yokohama by plane.
About 250 tons of Christmas packages already have been delivered. In addition to ship deliveries.

There were indications today that Tokyo may have a white Christmas. The city had its first snowfall of the season.

Interim Committee To Probe Roads

SALEM, Dec. 17 (AP)—The legislative interim committee on highways announced today it has obtained the services of Bob Glenn, Corvallis, professor of highway engineering at Oregon State college. He will act as resident engineer for the commission.

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British Boost Tin Price

LONDON, Dec. 17 (AP)—The ministry of supply announced last night the government today is lifting restrictions on domestic licenses to buy tin and simultaneously raising the delivery price to British consumers by 73 pounds (\$292) to a record high of 510 pounds (\$2040) per ton.
"City" sources predicted an increase of about 70 pounds (\$240) in prices paid to Malayan tin producers will follow "in a few days."

Klamath Man Promoted

Pfc. Donald Gourley, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Gourley, 5222 Baileton avenue, Klamath Falls, was recently promoted to the grade of corporal. It was announced today by Brig. Gen. B. M. Hovey, commanding general of Bolling field command.
Cpl. Gourley enlisted in the air force March 14, 1946, in Klamath Falls. After completing an extensive course in aircraft maintenance he was assigned to Bolling field. Last August he was assigned to "L" squadron there.
Born in Klamath Falls, he was graduated from Klamath Falls Union high school and worked for a box company before entering the air force.

Flu Cases Gain Over Oregon

PORTLAND, Dec. 17 (AP)—Influenza cases are increasing in Oregon, the state board of health's bulletin reported today, possibly heralding an early start of the flu season.
The flu wave occurred from March to May last spring, the bulletin pointed out, and since then had been minor until about three weeks ago.

Tug Aground Off Brazil

HALIFAX, N. S., Dec. 17 (CP)—The Canadian tug Shohomish is aground on San Marcos island off the east coast of Brazil and requires immediate assistance. Royal Canadian air force search and rescue division reported here early today.

The 549-ton tug is owned by Island Tug and Barge Limited of Victoria, B. C. How many were in her crew and other details were not known.
The SOS signal from the Shohomish was picked up by the Brazilian freighter Itamar, relayed to Brazil radio and picked up by the marine radio listening post here.
Position of the grounded ship was given as 2:10 south, 44:20 west.

Legionnaires Face Justice Charge

GLENDAL, Calif., Dec. 17 (AP)—Charges against 12 American Legionnaires and four newspapermen of disturbing a political meeting have been taken under submission by Justice of the Peace Kenneth A. White, who said he will give a decision next Tuesday.
The defense presented only one witness yesterday, then abruptly rested its case. Managing Editor Charles C. Hushaw of the Glendale News-Press, one of four defendants freed of charges earlier, was the witness.
Hugh Hardman's misdemeanor complaints allege that the group burst into his home, called the gathering a session of the Progressive Citizens of America and demanded that it break up.

Distillers Reject Grain Limit Figure

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17 (AP)—The distilling industry today rejected a government proposal to limit grain consumption to 2,500,000 bushels monthly and approved instead a top monthly use of 2,500,000 bushels.

The plan adopted was presented by former Secretary of War Robert Patterson on behalf of the Distilled Spirits Institute. It would run from December 25, when the present distillery shutdown ends, through March 31.

Secretary of Agriculture Anderson promptly accused the industry majority of seeking more grain than it needs to keep up with current demand and said:

Action Promised
"If the distillers do not adopt a program that will save grain, then I am going to recommend to congress this afternoon that it do something about it."

Senator Taft (R-Ohio) yesterday submitted a bill which would authorize Secretary Anderson to impose grain limits on distillers until February 1, as part of a federal anti-inflation bill.
Anderson told the distillers as they prepared at today's meeting for their vote, that he would be forced to recommend legislation if the 2,500,000-bushel plan were rejected.

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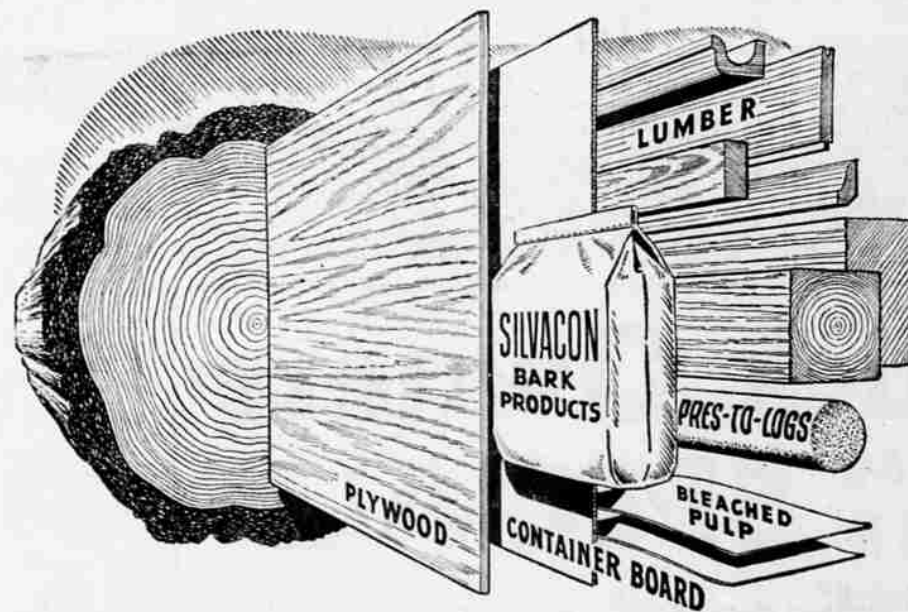
