Mrs. Santamaw, who was 83 last October, had been in failing health for a number of years. She was a native of Michigan and with her family moved to Klamath Falls in 1905. Mrs. Santamaw, long identified with lumber interests here, died February 11, 1943. Mrs. Santamaw is survived by two daughters and a son, Mrs. Dreher of Prineville, Mrs. Harry (Irene) Petersen of Portland, and Stanley Santamaw of Pasadena, Calif.

De Mille Loses Union Battle

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 17 (AP)—Cecil B. de Mille Tuesday lost his legal fight in the California supreme court to enjoin the American Federation of Radio Artists (AFRA) from suspending him as a member because he refused to pay a \$1 assessment to campaign against the 1944 Right of Employment act.

It was an unanimous decision, written by Justice John N. W. Shenk. The decision upheld the ruling of the Los Angeles superior court and the state district court of appeal.

Multi-Millionaire - Producer de Mille was forced off the air with his Lux theatre program in 1944 by AFRA when he refused to pay the assessment.

His services in connection with the radio program netted him \$98,200 a year, the opinion stated.

Solon To Defend USBR Grants

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17 (AP)—Chairman Jensen (R-Iowa) of the house subcommittee on interior appropriations said he planned to defend before the house today increased supplemental appropriations for four western reclamation projects.

Jensen's committee increased presidential requests of \$29,375,000 for the Columbia basin, the Central valley, and Colorado-Big Thompson and Davis dam projects to \$31,539,000 and the action was upheld by the full house appropriations committee.

The money, Jensen said, is necessary to prevent the projects closing down before the end of the fiscal year next June 30.

Lewis Demands Coal Pension

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17 (AP)—John L. Lewis, chief of the United Mine Workers, was reported today to be demanding a \$1200 annual pension for soft coal miners over 60 years of age who retire after 20 years' service.

While Lewis and the UMW declined confirmation, industry circles reported Lewis proposed the pension plan as part of the operations of the miners' welfare fund.

The fund, established in last year's contract between the UMW and the operators, is financed by a 10 cents a ton royalty on coal and now totals about \$50,000,000. It is used for medical, hospital and similar benefits.

Industry sources said, however, the present royalty would be insufficient to meet the additional costs of pensions. They calculated that 10 to 30 cents extra a ton would be necessary on the basis of current production of about 600,000,000 tons annually.

Trustees of the fund met here last week and are due to meet again tomorrow when the operators may give their reply to Lewis.

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Truman To Give Report On Aid Plan

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17 (AP)—President Truman has virtually completed the draft of a special message to congress proposing a plan for a European long-range recovery program under an independent economic recovery administration.

Presidential Secretary Charles G. Ross declined to discuss today the policy decisions made by Mr. Truman, but other White House aides said the proposal would give an economic cooperation administrator the right to make grants of cash or credit on his own authority.

To Review Loans

In addition, these sources, who may not be quoted by name, said the administrator would certify loans to the 16 participating nations subject only to review of the national advisory council. The council is composed of the secretaries of state, treasury and commerce and the heads of the federal reserve and export-import banks.

The proposed new agency would be directed by the single administrator, aided by a deputy administrator and represented abroad by a roving ambassador Lewis W. Douglas, now ambassador to Great Britain, has been mentioned for the latter post.

The three would be appointed by the president, subject to confirmation by the senate.

No Comment

Asked about a report on the plan published by the New York Times, Ross said he had "no comment," adding that he declined to forecast what the message would contain. It is now understood that Mr. Truman's lengthy message will be submitted to congress Friday just prior to adjournment of the special session.

Mr. Truman signed today a \$997,000,000 emergency foreign aid authorization bill he called the special session to consider. The measure was signed without ceremony because of the difficulty of summoning all those who had a part in its drafting. Congress now is working on legislation which actually will appropriate money to carry out the program.

Drafting of the long-range plan message to the special session got under way after Mr. Truman approved the plan of administration for the proposed \$16,000,000,000 European program, often called the Marshall plan.

The administrator of the separate economic cooperation administration would operate independently of the state department except in broad policy questions. The state department would maintain liaison with the roving ambassador through its membership on the national advisory council.

Navajo Aid Said "Phoney"

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., Dec. 17 (AP)—Dr. C. G. Salisbury of Ganado, Ariz., today accused the Indian bureau of using a "pseudo-starvation" scare to get \$80,000,000 more to play with.

"It is possible there are more hungry bureaucrats (hungry for another windfall) in Washington than there are starving Navajos on the reservation," he declared in a talk prepared for delivery to the Albuquerque Kiwanis club.

Dr. Salisbury, the sagebrush surgeon who for 20 years has headed the Presbyterian church mission and hospital in the heart of the reservation, called for abolition of the Indian bureau and state assumption of education, health and law enforcement among the tribesmen.

Plant Scrapping To Be Probed

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17 (AP)—The house foreign affairs committee approved today a resolution asking the administration to explain why it does not stop scrapping German industrial plants and let congress determine whether the plants are needed for European economic recovery.

The committee action simply sends the resolution to the house floor. A senate committee recently received testimony that some German plants in the American occupied zone are still being dismantled and sent to Russia as war reparations.

Togo Tells Of Getting Doublecross

TOKYO, Dec. 17 (AP)—Japan's wartime foreign minister Shigenori Togo told the international war crimes court in effect today that some of his country's naval and political leaders doublecrossed him in executing their sneak attack on Pearl Harbor, and he said he pro-

posed "to tell the full truth as it is known to me."

In a 3600-word statement which his attorney, Ben Bruce Blakeney, began reading today, Togo gave the fullest version of secret plotting that the court has heard in its 19-month session. Involved were many of Togo's fellow defendants.

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
