The purpose of this demonstration, that the women attending this meeting will bring to their units, is to give aid in putting man-made textiles to their best use by learning to recognize the qualities that give particular service for certain types of garments. To all attention to the increasing importance of labeling and to give assistance in laundering methods.

An ironing chart was displayed and discussed and the application of water repellent finish to cotton materials was demonstrated.
