

# French Union Group Split

PARIS, Dec. 19 (AP)—Representatives of the anti-communist minority of the powerful General Confederation of Labor (CGT) voted overwhelmingly today to split with the parent organization.

The delegates were believed to represent approximately 1,250,000 workers of the CGT's 6,900,000 adherents.

The break was made, a communiqué said, "to free the French syndical movement from all political control."

The resolution, calling on all followers of the minority tendency to resign their posts in the CGT, was approved by a vote of 156 to one, with two abstentions. The minority group, known as the "workers' force," directed its followers to prepare for a national congress to set up a "true confederal organization for all workers," and appealed to all French workers to support the new movement "for the total emancipation of the working class."

# Big Tree Topples Onto House

SEASIDE, Ore., Dec. 19 (AP)—A 175-foot spruce tree was blown onto the roof of a house here early Thursday without injury to the two occupants.

Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Allen were addressing Christmas cards in the kitchen. A part of the roof was demolished, and a piece of plywood torn from the ceiling struck Allen, but neither was hurt.

The tree came to rest on twin beds in the unoccupied second floor guest room.

No other damage was reported here from the gale-like winds that struck about 3 a. m.

# Butter Price Still Rising

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 19 (AP)—Dollar butter—no higher—continued the housewife on the Pacific coast today.

Advances of 1 to 2 cents in wholesale prices plus the quotations at new highs for the year in San Francisco, Portland and Seattle. The increases will be felt in the retail trade by Monday, with prices already around the 1 level.

Grade A (92 score) butter was wholesaling at 87 1/2-88 1/2 cents a pound in Los Angeles, 88-89 cents here, and 87 cents in Portland and Seattle. Grade B (90 score) was 79-81 in Los Angeles, 80-81 here and 81 in the northern cities.

Penning said he was paroled from the Idaho state penitentiary on December 12, where he was serving time on a one to 14-year term for forgery. He said he and another soldier stole a car at Monterey, Calif., drove to Fairfield, where they were picked up and lodged in the county jail there. The youth said he was then released by army authorities to his father when his true age was learned.

# Tax Slash Block Seen

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19 (AP)—Another White House road block hove into sight today for the GOP attempt to slash taxes \$5,000,000,000 (billion) a year.

Assertions by Rep. Knutson (R-Iowa) that this bill is "veto proof" were in sharp contrast to a renewal of President Truman's stand against any tax reduction now.

The implication was obvious that the tax measure might meet the same fate as two others passed at the last regular session of congress. Mr. Truman vetoed both of them.

He said then debt reduction must cut first and anyway the bills gave too much of the tax relief to the wealthy.

Knutson apparently based his "veto proof" label for the new version on the contention that it would give 77 per cent of the total tax reduction to persons with taxable incomes under \$4000 and only 22 per cent to those making more.

But at the president's news conference yesterday a reporter asked whether reports that the government will have a \$7,000,000,000 (billion) surplus for the current fiscal year ending June 30 would justify a tax cut.

Mr. Truman said no.
