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SS Officers To Die For Crimes

KRAKOW, Poland, Dec. 22 (AP)—Kraakow's supreme national tribunal today sentenced 23 top-ranking German S. S. (elite guard) officers to die for crimes against humanity committed while they were attached to the notorious Auschwitz (Oswiecim) extermination camp.

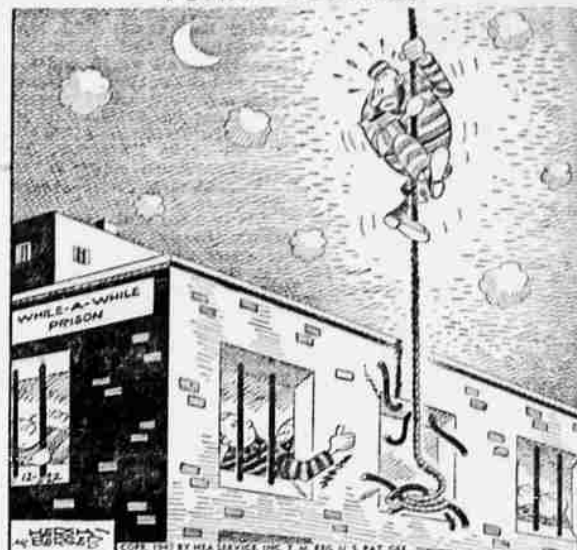
Five other defendants were sentenced to life imprisonment, six were given 15 year terms, two were sentenced to 10 years and three to five years. One defendant — Dr. Hans Munch of Munich — was acquitted.

Heading the list of those sentenced to death was Arthur Lieben-schel, 46, who succeeded Rudolf Hoefl, one-time commandant of the camp who was executed last April.
