Court Fails To Complete Three Cases

Three persons charged with felonies were brought into circuit court for arraignment and none of the arraignments was completed. Nelson Woodrow Hurd, 26-year-old ex-convict, was up for revocation of a two-year probation received in this court 21 months ago, and his case was continued until this afternoon by Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg.
