

Child Wins Polio Fight

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 23 (AP)—Jimmy Garlick—the 10-year-old victim of spinal tuberculosis who was adopted by the navy Seabees as their mascot four years ago—is due to arrive here today, victor in his 18-month battle to walk.

Jimmy's mother, Mrs. Louis Garlick, was waiting yesterday as her son walked through the gate of Philadelphia's Shriners hospital into her arms.

Behind that short walk was a story of a youngster's courage and determination—a determination that won for him the admiration of Seabees at posts all over the world.

Jimmy, who was stricken with the disease at the age of two, left the hospital yesterday wearing a sailor suit sent him by the Seabees commander, Admiral J. J. Manning. He was carrying a seabag brought by his mother.

Italian Troops Go To Germany

MOSCOW, Dec. 23 (AP)—Russian press dispatches intimated today that the United States was transferring troops from Italy to duty in the American zones of Austria and Germany.

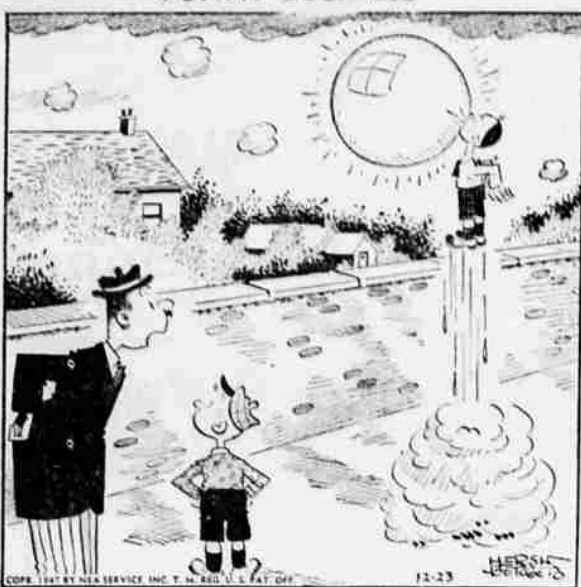
"It is no secret that some officers and men in the Mediterranean theater of operations transferred to other European assignments before the occupation of Italy ended December 14. Various dispatches from Italy during the fall told of the movement.

"The first train carrying U. S. army personnel from the theater to Germany left Leghorn October 8 with 55 officers and 100 dependents. Five other such trains followed. The movement was completed November 1."

Typhoon Moves On Philippines

TOKYO, Dec. 23 (AP)—A typhoon which caused heavy damage on Yap Island, between Guam and the southern Philippines, was placed late today at 30 miles southwest of Yap and moving westward at ten miles an hour.

The U. S. army's 43rd weather wing said the storm, with center surface winds of 90 miles an hour, was expected to be 180 miles northwest of the Palau Islands by tomorrow morning. It forecast high tides and heavy swells along the east coast of the Philippines.

Cemetery Plots Asked For Veterans

A proposal to furnish plots at Klamath Memorial park without charge for burial of Klamath war dead was presented to members of the city council by the memorial committee Monday night.

Mrs. Rose M. Poole and Jack Linman represented the committee. They further suggested that any honorably discharged veteran living in Klamath Falls, upon his death, be buried at the cemetery under the same condition.

The committee and council agreed to study the proposal further.

Big Christmas Gifts Given Out

OGDEN, Utah, Dec. 23 (AP)—Eighty-seven nephews and nieces of Mr. and Mrs. Ezra Richardson of Ogden will each get a \$1000 Christmas "bonus" check this year from the Richardsons.

This is the third consecutive year that Richardson, whose grocery store of a half century ago grew to a wholesale distributing firm serving several states, has mailed such gifts to relatives.

Mrs. Clyde Peterson, a niece, told the Ogden Standard-Examiner, that the gifts had totaled hundreds of thousands of dollars in the past three years. The Richardsons sent war bonds instead of checks during the final year of World War II.

Cordon To Run For Office Again

PORTLAND, Dec. 23 (AP)—Senator Guy Cordon said today he would be a candidate for re-election in the next election.

Arriving here en route to his home at Roseburg, Cordon said he would leave for Hawaii shortly after the first of the year in his capacity as chairman of the senate subcommittee on Hawaiian statehood.

He has been in the senate since appointment by the late Governor Snell in March, 1944, to fill the vacancy created by the death of Senator Charles L. McNary. The next November he was elected to complete the remaining four years of the term.

Satira To Ask Pardon

HAVANA, Cuba, Dec. 23 (AP)—Dancing girl Patricia Schmidt's lawyer said today she may ask President Ramon Grau San Martin to pardon her and remit a 15-year prison sentence imposed yesterday for killing her lover, John Lester Mer, on his yacht in Havana harbor last April.

The attorney, Rene Castellanos, said he asked her last night about her wishes concerning an appeal and that she felt it might be better to apply for a presidential pardon than to appeal to the supreme court, which under Cuban law has the right to increase, as well as decrease, lower court sentences.

Castellanos said the 22-year-old dancer from Toledo, O., was "trying all the time" and was "all broken up." Warden Carmelina Gamache of the Guanabacoa prison, where the court said she was to serve her term, said Miss Schmidt—whose professional name was Satira—was taken to the prison hospital last night in a state of collapse.

Ann Sothorn Sues For Divorce

HOLLYWOOD, Dec. 23 (AP)—Actress Ann Sothorn plans to divorce her actor husband.

Her studio announced that she would file suit today against Robert Sterling and ask custody of their three-year-old daughter, Patricia. Grounds of the action were not disclosed.

They were married in 1943, a year after she divorced Roger Pryor, actor-orchestra leader. She was born Harriette Lake in Valley City, N. O. Sterling was known as William John Hart back in Newcastle, Pa.

Directors announced the dividend raises the accumulated earnings to \$390 a share, to be paid on one million common shares due to be exchanged for securities of the debtor Portland Electric Power Co.
