Air Lab Jobs Still Open

Notice that a number of job openings for qualified engineering and skilled workers offering attractive salaries and working conditions are now available at the huge research laboratory of the national advisory committee for aeronautics, Langley field, Virginia, was received today by the Klamath Falls office of the Oregon state employment office.

Jack Almeter, manager of the office, declared that shortages of these specialized workers must be met as soon as possible to avoid serious delays in the government's aeronautical research program, vital to national defense and to America's leadership in commercial aviation. He said that the search for the necessary workers is being extended to many parts of the country.

This important research facility, operated by NACA, is seeking building architects, electrical, mechanical and aeronautical engineers; statistical technicians, physicists and draftsmen—architectural, mechanical and structural, the ES office manager said. Salaries for these positions range from \$2168 to \$4149 annually.

Openings also are available for skilled instrument makers and radio mechanics at yearly salaries ranging from \$1705 to \$3057.

Alder said that full details on each position will be made available to interested persons. The Langley field laboratory, he pointed out, has been operated by the government for 39 years and its accomplishments are many. Most of the preliminary design work on the D-558, the transonic Douglas Skytreak which holds the world air speed record of 656.6 miles per hour, was conducted there.

Qualified persons who are interested in these positions should apply for further information at the local office, Oregon state employment service. Applications can be accepted immediately.

China Munitions Shipment Stopped

VANCOUVER, B. C., Dec. 26 (CP)—Agents here for the Panamanian freighter Colima report the ship will not carry the \$1,200,000 munitions shipment to China as previously scheduled.

An official of the Kingsley Navigation company, limited, the vessel's agents, said that engine repairs to the Colima caused her to over-run the date for loading the cargo, which is now cancelled.

The ship's owners now seek a cargo which will take her to India.

Controversy raged for several days after it was made known that the Colima was to carry a large shipment of Canadian ammunition to the Chinese nationalist government.

Young Child Burns To Death

SAUGUS, Mass., Dec. 26 (AP)—A 35-year-old father of five children bundled his youngest into a blanket, and hurried down a ladder early today when fire swept their home—reaching the ground to find the blanket empty.

Firemen restrained the horror-stricken father, Richard Crowe, from returning to the flame-filled house and later found the charred body of Arthur Crowe, 2 years old, on the floor of his bedroom.

The child had slipped out of the blanket as the father slung him over his shoulder, pack fashion, the firemen said.

Crowe was awakened by barking of his pet dog about 5 a. m., and found fire filling the only staircase from the flame-filled first floor.

Crowe slid down a porch roof and jumped, barefooted to the snow covered ground, to get a ladder from a shed.

He led his wife, and their other four children, ranging in age from 4 to 10, down the ladder to safety with what he thought was his youngest, bundled in the blanket tied over his shoulder.
