Woelk Estate \$20,000

The estate of the late Charles Woelk, Hildebrand resident, who died December 14 at the age of 74, is estimated at over \$20,000 in real and personal property, according to probate filings.

Woelk left a will dated June 19, 1945, listing as heirs three sons, Carl, Albert and Elmer, and two daughters, Mrs. Irma Hayes and Helen Woelk. Carl Woelk petitions to be appointed executor of the estate, and J. H. Carnahan is the attorney.

Another estate filed for probate is that of Mrs. Burnice I. Cusick, who passed away December 17. She left a will and her estate is valued at \$6,000.

Her husband, James C. Cusick, through Attorney Arthur W. Schaupp, is the petitioner.

Yule Mail Still Coming

Santa Claus specials arriving from the north and south Thursday brought loads of late-mailed packages to Klamath Falls. Deliveries of gifts continued today with the extra staff of postal workers cut in half. Half of those remaining will be laid off tonight, the postmaster said and only one-fourth the original number of extras hired will be kept through Saturday.

A rough estimate of the volume of Christmas business this year in Klamath Falls, shows it up over last year but the smooth operation, due to fair weather and early mailing, lacked the congestion and hectic rush of other years making it seem hardly heavier than routine.

Sugar Beet Record Set

WALLA WALLA, Dec. 26 (AP)—An average yield of 25 tons per acre was shown by sugar beet growers of the Walla Walla district during 1947, believed to be the all-time record yield for any district in the U. S., it was announced today by L. W. Lindsey, field supervisor here for the Utah-Idaho Sugar company.

Total production was 60,466 tons of beets, harvested from 2,422 acres—an actual yield of 24.96 tons per acre. The Washington average, highest for any state in the country, was 21.05 tons, Lindsey said. The national average is approximately 13 tons to the acre.

Individual fields in the Walla Walla area yielded up to approximately 40 tons, and a number of growers exceeded the 30-ton figure. Sugar beets grown in the Walla Walla valley are shipped to Tappan for refining.

Woman Named To Japanese Office

TOKYO, Dec. 26 (AP)—Mrs. Shizue Yoshima, graduate of Women's college here and of the New York school of social work and a veteran of 30 years in child welfare work, today was named chief of the children's bureau of the welfare ministry.

Mrs. Yoshima was the second woman ever to be named head of a Japanese government office. Mrs. Kikue Yamakawa was appointed director of the women's and children's bureau of the labor ministry.

Insane Man Admits Murder

STOCKHOLM, Dec. 26 (AP)—The insane balloon vendor who police say confessed murdering Italian minister of Sweden Alberto Bellardi Ricci with a pair of scissors yesterday, was on his first leave from an asylum in seven years, Dr. Goldkuhl of Langbro mental home said today.

The vendor, Giuseppe Capocci, who was being treated for dementia praecox, was said to have "improved considerably" recently, and therefore was given a few hours of leave for Christmas.

Police Commissioner A. L. Jungdahl said Capocci confessed after being questioned, and expressed satisfaction over his deed. Capocci had entered the ministry villa under the pretext of wanting to demonstrate an invention—a pair of scissors which unscrewed.

When Ricci entered the room the visitor stabbed him six times with one blade of the scissors, hitting the heart once. Before the rest of the guests at a farewell luncheon for Ricci could subdue the vendor, he also succeeded in stabbing Marquis Cittadini-Cesi, first secretary of the Italian legation, through the face with the scissors.

Mexican Stabbed During Party
A young Mexican ex-soldier, Dairo Huanquez, is recovering in Hillside hospital from a three-inch knife wound in his back allegedly received during a drinking party near Algoma Wednesday.

Deputy Sheriff Marion J. Barnes, who investigated, said that Huanquez would not name his assailant. The young man came to the hospital for treatment Wednesday afternoon.

SA Kettles Raise Money

Red Troops In Hungary Yet

BUDAPEST, Dec. 26 (AP)—Although the Hungarian peace treaty went into effect more than three months ago, some 25,000 Soviet troops, including tactical forces, ranging from tank men to fighter pilots still are billeted on Hungarian soil.

The peace treaty called for Russian forces to be reduced to "lines of communication" units by December 15, but the pact contains no definite Soviet commitment on the number of troops needed for that purpose.

Observers say that since Hungary is now a sovereign power whose communist government can make any arrangement it desires with the red army command, the western powers are unable to make a diplomatic issue of what actually is continued Russian occupation of the strategic area of western Hungary.
