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The Doctor Says—

Cold Sores Hit In Winter

The winter is a particularly easy time for people to get cold sores, or what medical men call herpes simplex. This condition is known to be caused by a virus, which is a tiny living organism too small to see under an ordinary microscope. Probably the reason cold sores are more common in winter is because more people get run down physically at that time, and there are more infections going around.

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Business Racks Up Record Production During Year, But Outlook For '48 Glum

NEW YORK, Dec. 27 (P)—Business and industry rang down the curtain on a record year of activity and accomplishment this week.

Right through the final act, the triple-starred cast of men, money and machines performed brilliantly. While there were some signs of fatigue from the grueling pace which the business drama set throughout 1947, the pulsebeat of the day-to-day economy was strong and regular at the end.

The problem of inflation was the principal business worry. A quick glance at statistics disclosed business pulled up to the finish line with:

Production Up
Industrial production about as high as present capacity will permit; work for everyone who wanted it; a record national income in excess of \$225,000,000 annually; a tremendous backlog of unfilled orders for goods of all types and a strong demand from both domestic and foreign markets.

Business leaders, economists and forecasters in general had varying approaches but most look at 1948 with some degree of misgiving. Things are too good to last, they assert; inflation must be brought under control or else the economic pot will boil over sooner or later and stew the countryside with ruin.

There is quite a bit of evidence to back up the view of pessimists as business prepares to swing into the new year.

Prices Rising
Prices are still rising; many people are spending more than they are taking in; labor is poised to go aggressively after another round of wage increases; the export-import statistics are out of kilter; the stock market persists in its bearish outlook; and business is troubled in too many instances with difficulty in financing expansion. Bond and preferred stock prices are on the skids.

Manufacturers' inventories are top heavy. Despite a big Christmas business, unit sales of department stores are not increasing over last year at a normal rate, although dollar volume is higher. Merchants

expect real consumer resistance to high prices to develop now that the Christmas fling is over. Business failures are on the increase.

Many of these factors represent economic cause and effect stemming in large measure from rising prices but they are capable of gauging up and causing trouble.

For instance, if consumer demand for goods falls off because too much of the present family income has to pass over food counters, it can set in motion a chain reaction that will bounce from retailer to wholesaler to manufacturer to material supplier in fairly quick order and leave a train of joblessness or reduced purchasing power at each level.

The announcement came after completion of three days of aerial searching over thousands of square miles of the "top of the continent," in bleak Northwestern Alaska adjoining the polar ice cap.

Search operations continued yesterday despite a 1000-foot ceiling and intermittent blizzards. Ground temperatures throughout the Alaskan Arctic ranged from zero to 20 below.

Officers at Ladd field, the big bomber's home base, expressed the belief the crewmen carried ample emergency rations and cold weather protective equipment to survive for several days in event of a safe landing in the wilderness. It was viewed as a slim possibility, however, because no emergency message ever was received from the plane.

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
