

Free Tosses By Bulldogs Top Klamath

Game Pushed Into Overtime Before Pels Lose, 40-38

Two free throws which rang the bell in a three-minute overtime period at Pelican court last night gave the touring Albany Bulldogs a 40-38 victory over the Klamath Pelicans in the first of a two-game series. The other will be played tonight, beginning at 8 p. m.

The game was the first overtime affair for the local floor this season, and climaxed a spurge which saw Albany come from badly beaten at the half to close off in a Frank Merrillwell finish.

First two quarters of the game were pretty slow, with the play apparently in a holiday slump, but the tempo picked up considerably in the third period and reached a fever pitch in the fourth.

The Bulldogs set out to make the Pels eat dirt by pushing through five points before Klamath scored, but a lay-in each by Jack Lust and Don Zarosinski and a free throw by Jack Kennett tied the score and the Pels were out front by 8-7 at the end of the first quarter.

HIGH AT HALFTIME

During the second canto the Klamath boys doubled the scoring on the Bulldogs and were leading 24-15 at intermission.

My that time it was looking like another night of exercise for the Pels, but Albany came back with a lot more fire than was expected. The Bulldogs narrowed the gap with Guard Junior Simons suddenly getting hot and slipped up on the Pelicans in the final minutes of the fourth quarter.

With the score at 35-34 for Klamath, Albany grabbed the lead for the first time since the early minutes of the game with a sinker from the keyhole. Bob Barnes evened the count at 36-up with a free throw and Don Zarosinski popped in another free one to put Klamath ahead by a point.

But Simons scored a bulseye on a pivot shot from the keyhole with 20 seconds to go and had the Bulldogs ahead again. Jack Kennett, who earlier had tied the score in the first quarter with a foul shot, did it again with only three seconds remaining.

The regular playing period ended 38-38.

Kennett's only points of the evening were his two foul shot completions.

POSTERIOR FIGHT

The overtime period consisted of considerable shooting and the same amount of missing as the two squads battled for possession of the ball. In the melee Albany drew a couple of charity throws and made them good. Roger Reed and Hal McCloskey, a pair of reserves with iron nerves, made good when the occasion arose.

A minute-and-a-half stall by Albany helped the cause immensely.

The boys from the far north end of the county may be plotting something unseemly for the county small school basketball league. Ray Oehlerich's isolated Gilchrist Grizzlies are liable to be "X"—the unknown factor in the conference.

Gilchrist, in two outings against county competition, has done 50-50, but both games were against the Chiloquin Panthers and the Grizzlies won the one that counted in league standings. Chiloquin's 40-30 win in the non-league practice game looked empty as Mother Hubbard's proverbial cupboard when Gilchrist returned the favor 40-38.

Guard Dave Anderson appears to be the most dangerous Gilchrist threat, with Jim Shelton next as a scoring potential. Shelton is the center. John Reid is the other starting guard, Jimmy Van Tassel and John Toomey the forwards.

Based on heart of Klamath Falls might just be in line for a county hoop championship, having already whipped Malin and Bonanza of the league. The Malin game (41-30) was a conference counter, and the Trojans are underrated. They'll bear watching.

But the county league is hard to put a finger on because the various scheduled games don't actually figure as much except to gauge the squads for the season-ending tournament. The county champ is not the team which wins the most games during the season's play, but is the one that comes out on top of the tournament in February.

However, it's a good idea to get into the winning habit early.

Sugar Taken Out Of Rose Bowl

But now, with the Big Nine tie-up, the split is somewhat different. The invited school gets its \$100,000, more or less, all right, but has to divvy it up around the league. SHRINE BOWLERS TAKE PRACTICE IN SECRECY

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 27 (AP)—"Secret" practice sessions for the New Year's Day East-West football game are drawing hundreds of fans who complain to overwhelmed gatekeepers they will have no other chance to see the college stars.

"We can't get tickets to the game, so we're going to watch them practice," chorused some 500 fans watching the West team work out at Stanford university yesterday.

Although Coach Don Faurot of Missouri ordered the gates locked for his West squad's scrimmage, many of the sideliners arrived on the field before the guards. Fence climbers joined the early birds. Efforts to shoot them away failed.

At Santa Clara university, Coaches Bernie Bierman, Howard Odell and Andy Kerr of the East team had more privacy but were troubled by the presence of some onlookers.

Johnny Lujack of Notre Dame found his mark consistently in the Eastern team's passing practice. Bill Swilacki of Columbia and Lou Mihajlovich of Indiana were his best receivers.

Tackle George Connors of Notre Dame missed the afternoon scrimmage because of a stomach ailment which placed him in the infirmary.

Faurot said after the afternoon scrimmage he was displeased by the West's lack of smoothness. "To get smoothness," he said, "we'll have to limit our attack."

The West team tried out two backfields, made up of Bob Harlehurst of Denver, Ted Kenfield of California, Ed Smith of Texas Mines and either Ainslee Bell of Stanford or Billy Williams of Idaho in one, and Virgil Eikenberg of Rice, Herman Wedemeyer of St. Mary's, Cal Ross of UCLA and George Quist of Stanford in the other.

Oregon State Stumbles In Extra Inning

Vandals Beat Out Pepperdine Quint With Seconds Up

Washington and Idaho upheld the prestige of the coast conference's Northern division with pre-season basketball victories last night, but Oregon State's defending champions ran a-cropper against Stanford.

The touring Washington Huskies turned back Ohio State, 61-55, for their second win in four starts during their current Midwestern road trip which ends tonight with a return to the Grizzlies.

Center Jack Nichols sparked the Huskies with 15 points, but was closely followed by Bill Taylor and Sammy White with 14 apiece and Bob Jorgensen with 10.

Ohio State led at the half, 30-25, but Washington whittled away to tie the score at 45-all midway in the second half, then went into a lead which it never relinquished when Guard Bobby Bird stole the ball and dribbled half the length of the floor to dunk in a lay-up shot.

SQUEEZED BY

Idaho squeezed through in the last 20 seconds to defeat Pepperdine College, 52-50, in the first round of the annual Los Angeles invitational basketball tournament. Center Jack Phoenix bucketed the deciding goal and took scoring honors with 19 points.

The Vandals' victory came in the nightcap of four-game tournament opener, which extended until after 1 a. m. The lead changed 14 times, with Idaho ahead 21-20 at the intermission.

Tonight the Vandals met Marshall College of Huntley, W. Va., in the semi-finals, with Syracuse and Brigham Young tangling in the other championship bracket.

Oregon State battled into an overtime period before succumbing to Stanford, 53-48. Behind 26-17 at the half, the Beavers knotted the count at 45-all as the gun sounded but could not match the Indians' drive in the overtime. The game was sent into the extra period when Cliff Crandall, OSC forward, snatched the ball from Stanford's Dave Davidson and shot the tying basket. Bill Rose, speedy Indian forward, was high man with 23 points. Ernie Neal led the Beavers with 11.

RAY SQUAD NEXT

Tonight Oregon State will play the University of San Francisco, which dropped a 57-43 decision to the University of Kansas in the first game of the doubleheader at San Francisco.

The Kansans will go north today for a series with the University of Oregon, December 29 and 30. The Webfoots swing into action this evening at Eugene against Springfield College.

Army Refuses Glenn Davis Release Bid

WASHINGTON, Dec. 27 (AP)—The army refused today to approve Glenn Davis' request that he be allowed to resign from the service to play professional football.

Secretary of the Army Royal made public a reply to the former West Point football star, a turn-down answer which had the approval also of the army's personnel board and Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, chief of staff.

Davis was told that the army could not, at this time, accept the resignation of any officer except for extreme hardship or other humanitarian reasons.

Davis, who was graduated from the military academy last June and commissioned a second lieutenant, now is on leave at his home in Claremont, Calif.

Plant TKO'd In Sixth By Young

NEW YORK, Dec. 27 (AP)—A sparse crowd of 1447 braved a blizzard last night and paid \$3582 to see Terry Young, 136½, put a technical sixth-round knockout on Bobby Plant, 141, formerly of Milwaukee, and now fighting out of Brooklyn.

It was Young's sixth win since returning to the ring.

Plant went down for a one count in the fifth from a left and right to the head and was down again at the bell, although he was on his knees waiting for a full count when the round ended with the count at six.

PASADENA, Calif., Dec. 27 (AP)—Coach Fritz Crisler eased down on Michigan's Rose Bowl conditioning schedule today, sending the Wolverines through one workout instead of the two they have been taking since arriving here a week ago.

The squad apparently is shaping up nicely but Crisler hasn't been too enthusiastic about the warm weather the past few days.

Michigan's rival, Southern California, has had much the same climate at their training base at Santa Barbara but Coach Jeff Cravath has expressed no concern.

"We're used to it," Cravath said, and an aide added the query: "I wonder if it will handicap Michigan?"

Both squads will rest tomorrow.

Although Michigan uses a two-team system and frequent replacements, the Wolverines do not use the "messenger boy" method of signal calling which came into vogue this season with unlimited substitutions.

Crisler made it clear to newsmen yesterday that Howard Yerges is his quarterback.

"I sent in only one play this season, and it lost five yards," said Crisler. "So I gave the game back to Yerges. And that's the way it'll be in the Rose Bowl."

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Jack Kramer Loses Initial Pro Match

NEW YORK, Dec. 27 (AP)—Jack Kramer lost his first match as a professional tennis player but he was the hero of the 15,114 spectators who turned out for the event in Madison Square Garden last night in spite of the worst snow storm in New York's history.

Bobby Riggs, an experienced pro tennis trouser, defeated Kramer 6-2, 10-8, 4-6, 6-4. It was a best three out of five match.

The result was pretty decisive and probably the only bright spot from Big Jake's viewpoint was the affair was a complete sellout. Although the weather kept many of them away, 16,052 people paid up to \$7 a ticket to see the amateur tennis champion make his debut against the professional boss.

They contributed to a gate of \$55,730.16, the largest in pro tennis history, giving the backers of the 65-match tour a good start toward the \$50,000 they guaranteed Kramer for his first year.

So far as play went, the one-set curtain-raiser in

which Australia's Denny Falls conquered Ecuador's Pancho Segura, 15-13, was more interesting. These two, also making their debuts as pros, fought on virtually even terms until their match was called to permit the main event to start on time.

The spectators, rooting for Kramer with rather more vehemence than the galleries at Forest Hills, Germantown or Los Angeles, applauded Riggs' error and cheered loudly when the lanky Californian made a good shot. Kramer gave them plenty of opportunity to cheer, for he repeatedly caught Bobby off balance with cross court shots or passed him trying to reach the net.

But Jake was erratic, too, and in the long run it was Bobby's steadiness that paid off. In the four sets, Riggs made only 72 errors as compared to Kramer's 121.

In the concluding doubles match, Kramer and Falls defeated Riggs and Segura, 6-2, 6-4.

Cardinals Favored For Title

CHICAGO, Dec. 27 (AP)—The Philadelphia Eagles and Chicago Cardinals held final dress rehearsals at Comiskey park today and the rival coaches reported both squads were near peak condition for the National Football league championship engagement tomorrow.

Jimmy Conzelmann's Cards, favored by 10-12 points, were ready with a terrific one-two scoring threat with the combination of Fullback Pat Harder and Halfback Charlie Trippi being in top shape at the same time for the only time this season.

Both have been handicapped with injuries throughout the campaign and never have been able to go to full steam together.

The Eagles have had to operate with key men on the cripple list, but Coach Earle (Greasy) Neale said today that with the exception of Halfback Noble Doss, who has two fractured ribs, the squad is in fine shape.

During the 12-game regular season, the Cardinals averaged 25.3 points per game and limited opposition to 19.2. One of their nine league victories was a 45-21 decision over Philadelphia. They also beat the Eagles 38-21 in an early exhibition. Neale's outfit averaged 25.6 points and gave up 20.1 to the opposition.
