

Truman Brands Anti-Inflation Bill Inadequate

WASHINGTON, Dec. 29 (AP)—President Truman promised to sign into law today the republican anti-inflation bill, but he branded it as "pitifully inadequate" to deal with the "grave peril" confronting the nation's economy.

Several key republicans struck back with angry words of their own to defense of the voluntary steps which form the backbone of the GOP measure.

Thus the high cost of living and how to bring it down sizzled as the major political issue to start off the 1948 election year.

Mr. Truman took the unusual course of issuing a Sunday statement to announce his decision and to declare that 1 congress dog may give him better weapons to fight inflation the country may face a "serious depression."

He left the actual signing until today, at an hour which the White House did not specify. The measure becomes effective immediately once it is signed.

The first official action to carry out its provisions appeared likely to be an order to distillers to hold their grain consumption to 2,500,000 bushels a month during the five weeks the bill revives Mr. Truman's wartime powers over whiskey making.

A 60-day voluntary distilling program came to an end Christmas Eve with the government and major distillers at odds over a new conservation program.

The bill also extends the president's controls over exports and railroad transportation and provides for voluntary food programs. It does not give him the standby price control and rationing powers he asked for in his 10-point program laid before the special session.

Centering his fire on the bill's provisions for voluntary agreements in industry, business and agriculture to share scarce materials without incurring the risk of anti-trust prosecution, the chief executive declared:

"It is far too late in the fight against inflation to place our reliance upon voluntary action."

"This bill fails to include the key measures which are essential to an effective anti-inflation program," Mr. Truman asserted.

"This bill will not reduce the high cost of living, and it will not keep prices from going even higher."

Rep. Wolcott (R-Mich.), who sponsored the measure along with Senator Taft (R-Ohio), shot back that if living costs are not brought down "the fault will be that of the president and not of congress."

But Senator Ball (R-Minn.), a fellow member of the senate-house economic committee headed by Taft, said the president's statement "smells a bit of politics."

Democrats who commended supported the chief executive's stand. But while most republicans indicated continued firm opposition to granting the price-wage and rationing powers Mr. Truman asked, there were these two significant developments:

1. Senator Flanders (R-Vt.) declared in Chicago last night that he had reached the "reticent conclusion that we will have to institute statutory rationing" of meat. Flanders told the American Economic association that "the demands for higher wages are supported by increasing living costs."

2. Senator White of Maine, the GOP floor leader, said there should be the same sort of republican - democratic cooperation on inflation and other big domestic problems as has marked foreign policy issues.

Three Leap From Flaming House

OSWEGO, Dec. 29 (AP)—Mrs. James F. Myers and her two children leaped from a second-story window today when their house in the Briarwood district near here caught fire and trapped them upstairs.

Awakened by the smell of smoke, Mrs. Myers said she opened the door to a wall of flame. She and the children were not hurt in their leap to safety.

Cause of the fire, which destroyed the house, was not immediately determined.

Washington High On Wheat List

SEATTLE, Dec. 29 (AP)—A possible third place ranking among the nation's wheat producing states was seen for Washington State today in a department of agriculture estimate that the state's winter wheat crop would total 73,650,000 bushels, highest in its history.

The forecast was made by Haven C. R. Stewart, department statistician. He credited above normal plantings and favorable weather for the increase.

The 1947 crop totaled 51,850,000 bushels, and the 10-year average has been 32,626,000 bushels, he said. The 10-year average has placed Washington sixth nationally, but only Kansas and Oklahoma have exceeded the 1948 estimate.

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Gretna Victory Is Christmas Ship

SEATTLE, Dec. 29 (AP)—Designation of the steamship Gretna Victory as the Pacific Northwest "Christmas Ship" to Europe's needy was disclosed here in a week-end announcement.

The 10,881-ton vessel, due here from Japan about January 26, will take on 30 carloads of food and clothing in Seattle, Tacoma and Portland before its European voyage.

Simultaneous with designation of the ship was the announcement of the arrival of a 30-ton carload from Montana, including 100-pound sacks of flour, canned milk and cereals already packed for export. The shipment was hauled free by the Great Northern railroad.

Woman Saved From Drowning

JUNCTION CITY, Ore., Dec. 29 (AP)—Two women were rescued from the Tom river here Saturday after their truck crashed off a bridge into the water.

The driver, Violet Brooks, 18, said she kicked her way out of the cab, dragging a blanket that she thought was the coat of her mother, Mrs. Lela Brooks, 43, Junction City. When she surfaced, two duck hunters rowed over and pulled her to safety.

A passing car stopped and Thomas Maloney and Floyd Borgaard, Junction City businessmen, gave her first aid while Robert Scofield, Linfield college student, dove in to rescue the mother. He pulled her to safety and the women were rushed to town. The duck hunters left without giving their names.

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Jewish Mayor Denies War Wish

NEW YORK, Dec. 29 (AP)—Neither Arabs nor Jews want warfare in the Holy Land, says Mayor Israel Rokach of the all-Jewish city of Tel Aviv, and "the present Arab attacks are the handiwork of hired hands directed by intriguing politicians."

"Palestine Jewry is most reluctant to open warfare with the Arabs," he said in a statement released in his behalf last night by the Jewish National Fund of America.

Mayor Rokach came here to attend a Jewish National Fund conference to be held the first week in January. Accompanying him were his wife and Abraham Harzfeld, Palestine labor leader and colonization expert.

How to Roast

Prepare for roasting just as you would a whole turkey. Skewer or sew skin to meat on edge of breast bone. Skewer or tie wing and leg to body to hold flat. Place turkey over mound of stuffing arranged on double thickness of well greased waxed or heavy brown paper. Roast according to Turkey Timetable.

14-17 LBS.	4 to 4 1/2 hours
18-25 LBS.	4 1/2 to 5 hours

6-9 LBS.	2 1/2 to 3 hours
10-12 LBS.	3 to 3 1/2 hours

EVISCERATED MEANS—Ready-to-cook, pre-drawn and dressed. Add 20% to purchased weight when figuring roasting time to allow for stuffing.

NEW YORK DRESSED MEANS—Means that turkey has been picked, but not drawn, head and feet are on. When dressed, weight is lessened 15 to 20%, but stuffing makes up difference, so figure oven time by purchased weight.
