

24 Survivors Of Shipwreck Found Safe

MANILA, Dec. 30 (AP)—Twenty-four bedraggled survivors of the motorship Kina, victim of a Christmas Day typhoon, and a young American couple who also were victims of the storm, arrived by plane today.

All will undergo complete medical checkup, then rest.

The two besides the Kina survivors are Lyn Hall, 27, of Newton, Mass., and Mrs. Hall, whose family lives in Corvallis, Ore.

The Halls were picked up by the Luzon Stevedoring company tug, Runner, from a small native outrigger after their landing barge had been lost in the storm. They operate a small lumber concession in Northern Samar and had spent Christmas night at Malaga after their barge sank.

Tidal Wave

A 20-foot tidal wave smashed the shore while they were in the Philippine fishing village. As soon as the sea subsided they set out for their home in the outrigger and were picked up by the Runner, which was patrolling for Kina survivors.

Men on the Kina and others from the area where the Danish motor vessel went down after striking on rocky Camandag island in the Samar sea, said today that hope was virtually extinct that any of the 34 still unaccounted for would be found alive.

Seventeen of the crewmen who were rescued had to swim ashore.

Couldn't Swim

Survivors said Assistant Engineer Henning Weywandt, who was lost with the Kina, was heard to say after the crash: "It is no use for me. I can't swim." Weywandt's body was buried yesterday at Calbayog, Samar island, where the rescued were taken by the Norwegian freighter Samuel Bakke.

Three American women who survived the ordeal reported they were in fine shape after they arrived here in a Philippine air line plane from Masbate island, where they had been taken by the tug, Runner.

They are Ann Malek of Jewett City, Conn., Louise Rosso of New York and Ada Espinashade of Chicago.

Dodge Slates New Trucks

DETROIT, Mich., Dec. 30 (AP)—A completely new line of Dodge "Job-Rated" trucks comprising 248 basic chassis models ranging from 4250 to 23,000 pounds gross vehicle weight and up to 40,000 pounds gross train weight was announced today by L. F. VanNortwick, director of truck sales of the Dodge division, Chrysler Corporation.

Some models of the new trucks will be displayed starting January 7 by Lombard Motors in Klamath Falls.

A combination of massive strength and smoothly flowing lines is the keynote of styling for the new trucks. They were designed to combine appearance with comfort, safety, performance, economy and ease of handling.

Front axles have been moved back and engines have been moved forward to place more of the gross vehicle weight on the front axle and provide better weight distribution. The wheelbase for conventional models through the 2-ton has been reduced eight inches, while the 2½ and 3-ton models have been reduced six inches. The new trucks have been engineered so that de-

spite the shorter wheelbases, the cab-to-axle dimensions remain practically unchanged, making it possible to use the same length bodies as before.

U Saw To Die For Slaying

RANGOON, Burma, Dec. 30 (AP)—U Saw, prewar premier of Burma, and eight others were sentenced today to die for the assassination of Maj. Gen. U. Aung San and six other Burmese cabinet ministers.

A special Burmese tribunal found that U Saw, leader of the opposition Aungmye party, was the brains behind the plot in which assassins burst into the ministers' council chamber July 19 and sprayed it with machine-gun bullets.

The 45-year-old U Saw long had been at odds with Aung San, anti-communist leader who was to have become the first premier of independent Burma in January. He was arrested shortly after the assassination.

Suspicion

U Saw was removed from the premiership by the British during the war on suspicion of collaboration with the Japanese. He returned to political prominence after the war's end. He resigned from the governor's executive council in protest against the signing in London by Aung San of the agreement under which Burma will become self-governing. Since that time he devoted himself for the most part to his newspaper, the Sun, in which he wrote a daily political column.

Himself the target of assassins' bullets in 1946, U Saw since that time had attended public gatherings only with an armed guard.

One defendant, Ba Nyun, who turned state's evidence, was acquitted by the court. All had pleaded innocent when they were arraigned November 4.

Britain To Ship Tin To Russians

LONDON, Dec. 30 (AP)—A board of trade spokesmen said today that Britain will start deliveries of tin to Russia under the new trade pact as soon as details have been worked out with Russian buying agencies in the United Kingdom.

The Moscow radio said earlier Russia will send Britain 750,000 tons of coarse grain instead of the 500,000 tons of animal foodstuffs previously reported, under terms of the pact signed Saturday in Moscow. The broadcast quoted a Tass dispatch as saying Russia had guaranteed to deliver the grain between February and September.

Heavy Game Fine Given

EUGENE, Dec. 30—Federal and state game officers, on a joint patrol here picked up a number of game law violators including one unidentified person suspected of hunting ducks over an artificially baited pond.

Federal Officer Jim Savage said that the U. S. district attorney in Portland would be asked to place a federal charge against the latter.

In Eugene Judge Chester Anderson levied fines of \$30 each on two hunters who pleaded guilty to early hunting and \$30 on one late hunter. Two men found in possession of a pheasant out of season were fined \$80.

Judge Charles Graden of Florence fined three men caught hunting ducks from a motor boat, \$104.50 each, and levied fines of \$29.50 on several persons who pleaded guilty to late hunting, hunting with a 22 calibre rifle and hunting with an unplugged gun.
