

Log Hauling Ordinances Overhauled

Sections of the city's traffic ordinance covering log hauling is being revised by City Attorney Henry Perkins. A committee of loggers and city officials met Monday night to work out the amendment.

Originally, the city drafted an amendment covering log trucking on the traffic ruling, but loggers protested that the provisions of the amendment were not adequate and would give satisfactory results.

Councilmen decided that the loggers knew the problem better than anyone else and the committee was appointed to work out a solution. The new amendment will include provisions for strengthening the tongue on logging trucks and trailers. It will also require two safety chains between the front of the tongue and the truck. Loggers pointed out that the tongue is the weak point, and the chains will serve as an auxiliary safety measure.

Also covered will be the proper use of chains around logs.

On the committee are Mayor Ed Ostendorf, Councilmen Angus Newton, W. D. Miller and A. F. Condey, Police Chief Orville Hamilton, Attorney Perkins, and representing the loggers, Tom Brown, Bill Hayden, Harry Meener and John Hayes.

"Undeliverable" Packages Show Drop During '47 Rush

While the number of "undeliverable" packages this Christmas season is well under the volume for the 1946 season, the volume of undelivered "deliverable" packages is greater.

Undeliverable packages are those which have lost their addresses and those which are crushed and damaged, obliterating the address. There is a minor number of these this year compared with other years, indicating that the public is becoming educated to wrapping and addressing packages properly.

The undelivered deliverable packages are those which must be signed for and attempts are still being made to deliver those in the post office now. Second notices have been sent out on these and it is believed that the addresses may be out of town vacationing.

Such mail is kept for a certain length of time and if not delivered at the end of the period are returned to the sender.

Mail claims on damaged packages and missing packages are expected to start coming in about the first week of the new year, if there are any. People usually wait a week or so on missing packages before filing claims, and on damaged packages to see just what can be done about them before coming in to the post office. Burt E. Hawkins, Klamath Falls postmaster, said. Postal authorities have no way of knowing if contents of packages have been damaged unless they are notified, he said.
