Three To Be Ordained

Mrs. Soucy, the former Dorothy Smith of Walsall, England, met her husband in a YMCA canteen in Kitteridgen where she was stationed with the women land army. They were married in Walsall in 1945 and she came to the United States 18 months ago.

UN Ponders Fresh Cease Fire Order

BATAVIA, Java, Jan. 2 (AP)—The United Nations good offices committee was reported today to be preparing another proposal for effecting a cease fire order in Indonesia.

A well informed Dutch source said the new proposal was drawn up after an "important" meeting last night between Dutch Premier Louis J. M. Beel and three Dutch cabinet members.

The UN committee's newest proposals are expected to be handed to the Dutch and Indonesian governments tomorrow.

War Dead Ruling Made

There are many next of kin of World War II deceased who have two or more sons interred in temporary overseas cemeteries. If these next of kin elect to have final interment for their loved ones in a local community of the United States and desire to have their sons returned simultaneously, the armed services will carry out their wishes.

This statement was made today by Lt. Col. Vernon L. Lewis, chief, American graves registration division, Auburn, Wash.

"In most cases," Lewis stated, "where a family has suffered a double loss, their loved ones are interred in cemeteries many miles apart. Since all cemeteries are not evacuated simultaneously, their loved ones normally would not be returned together. When next of kin desire to have them returned to their community at the same time, regardless of how many thousands of miles now separate them overseas, we will make the necessary arrangements to carry out their wishes."

Next of kin of World War II deceased who are affected by this announcement are advised to write Colonel Lewis, Auburn, Wash., informing him of their detailed desires.

Twins Pose Big Problem For Board

READING, Pa., Jan. 2 (AP)—A bright college hadn't counted on twins when it promised a scholarship to Berks county's first 1948 baby.

As a result the college board of trustees—used to solving things academically—today has a human interest problem if not a technical one.

Two boys were born to Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Houck of Reading, Pa. The first boy arrived at 11:41 p. m., December 31—technically ineligible for the scholarship. His twin brother arrived 30 seconds after 1947 became history.

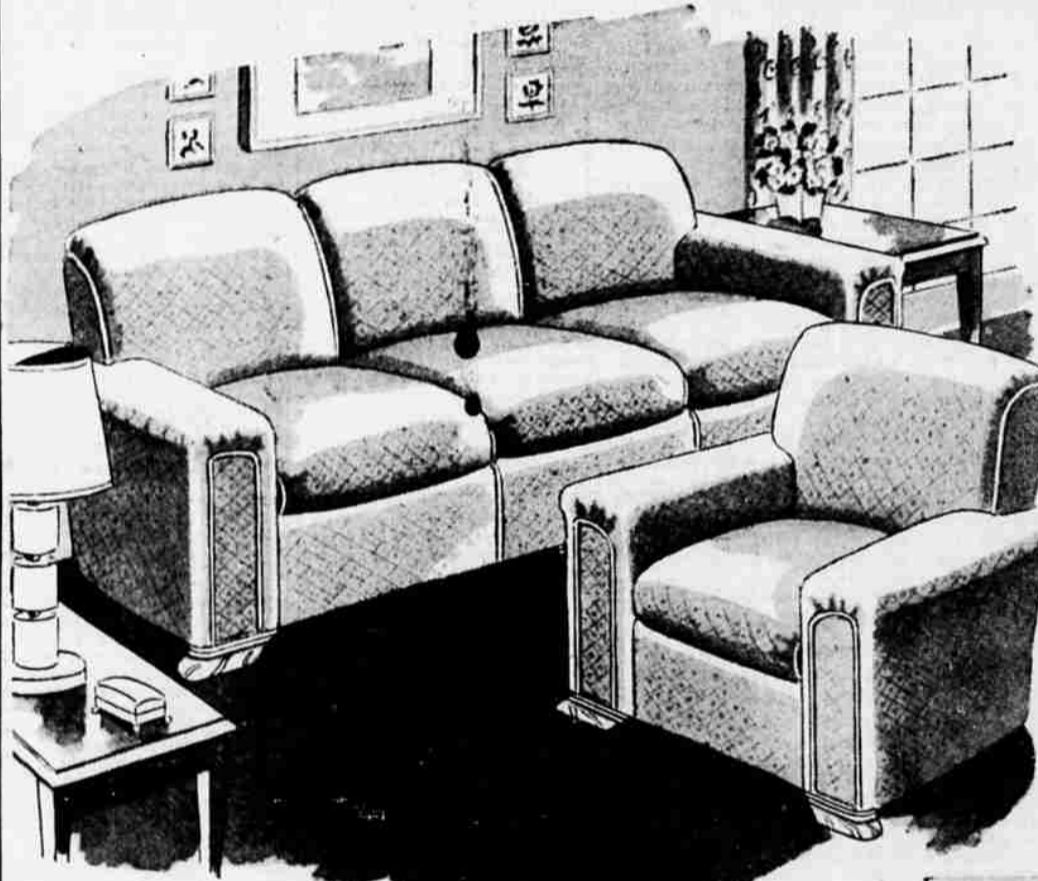

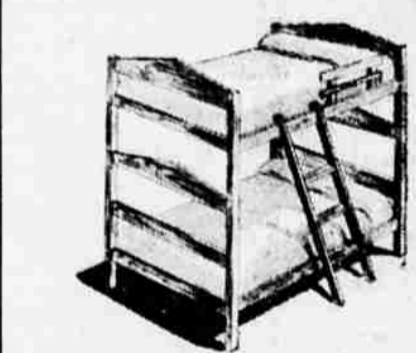

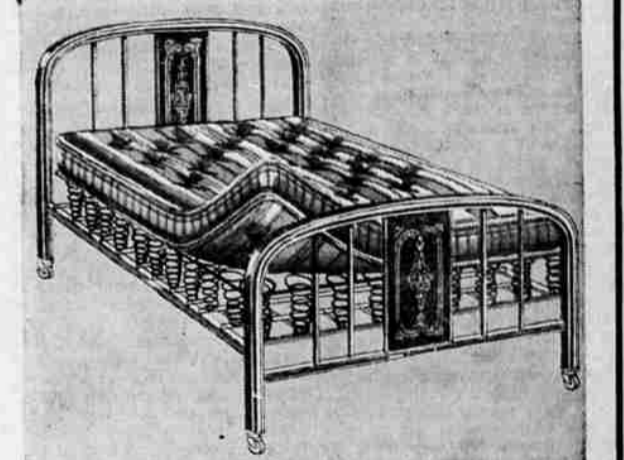
