Heavy Snow Closes Rim Road Sunday

A heavy snow, so high in water content that Crater Lake National park snow equipment could not cope with it, has fallen to a depth of 49 inches since New Year's Eve bringing the total depth on the level to 81 inches. Crater lake rangers reported this morning.

Only a few cars, 45 in all, braved the highways yesterday and when they reached Annie Spring found the road to the rim closed. Plows were operating steadily, however, and the rangers said it was probable that the road would be open to two-way traffic by 10 a. m. this morning.

No Snow Sunday
Despite the fact that the Klamath basin experienced its biggest storm of the season, no snow fell Sunday at Crater lake, but it started snowing hard this morning. Maximum temperature Sunday was 26 degrees; 30 degrees last night and 30 at 10 a. m. today.

Visitors at the park Sunday totaled 186, and those interested in skiing enjoyed the sport around Annie Spring although the weather was not good. Of the 49 inches which has fallen since New Year's Eve, the exceptionally high water content has measured up to six inches.

Roads are open to two-way traffic across the park. Telephone communication from the park outside has been out for the past two days but early this morning lines were repaired. Interruption was caused by heavy snow breaking down the wires, the rangers said.

Skiing should be good despite weather conditions, the rangers' office advised today.

NEW VETS HOSPITALS
Construction of three hospital projects, already authorized by congress, will be commenced in the Pacific Northwest in the near future, the VA has announced. A total of 650 beds for veterans will be added by the program.

Ground is to be broken for construction of the 300-bed general medical and surgical hospital at Seattle in June or July, according to an announcement last week by Col. L. E. Hewitt, district army engineer.

Bids for construction of Spokane's 200-bed hospital will be opened late in February, Col. Hewitt said. On the same date the VA will also open bids on a 150-bed addition to the Portland hospital, to care for veterans suffering from tuberculosis.

Other hospitals on the VA hospital construction program, for which plans are now being drawn, are to be located at Klamath Falls, Ore., and Miles City, Mont.

MORE WOMEN IN VA CARE
There has been an increase of 905 women veteran patients in the veterans administration hospitals throughout the country in the past 15 months, it was reported by the VA this week.

The number of women hospitalized by the VA grew from 1130 in July of 1946 to 2035 in October, 1947, the last month for which figures were available. Of these, 1230 were in VA hospitals and 805 were in non-VA hospitals. In addition, there were 238 women in VA domiciliary homes.

Of the 2035 women under VA care, 1432 were veterans of World War II.

As of June 30, there were 13,652 women veterans of World War II receiving compensation from the VA as a result of war service. There were 4564 women veterans of World War I also receiving disability compensation or pension.

Reds Accuse US, Britain

MOSCOW, Jan. 5 (AP)—Pravda, communist party organ, declared today that Secretary of State George Marshall and French Foreign Minister Georges Bidault lingered in London after the official closing of the council of foreign ministers last month in order to hold a conference of their own with British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin.

(Marshall left London, December 18—three days after the Big Four conference ended.)

In a half-page article devoted to reasons why the council failed, Pravda asserted that post-conference speeches by Marshall and Bevin "coincided in every way" on the main issues. It added that this was no mere coincidence.

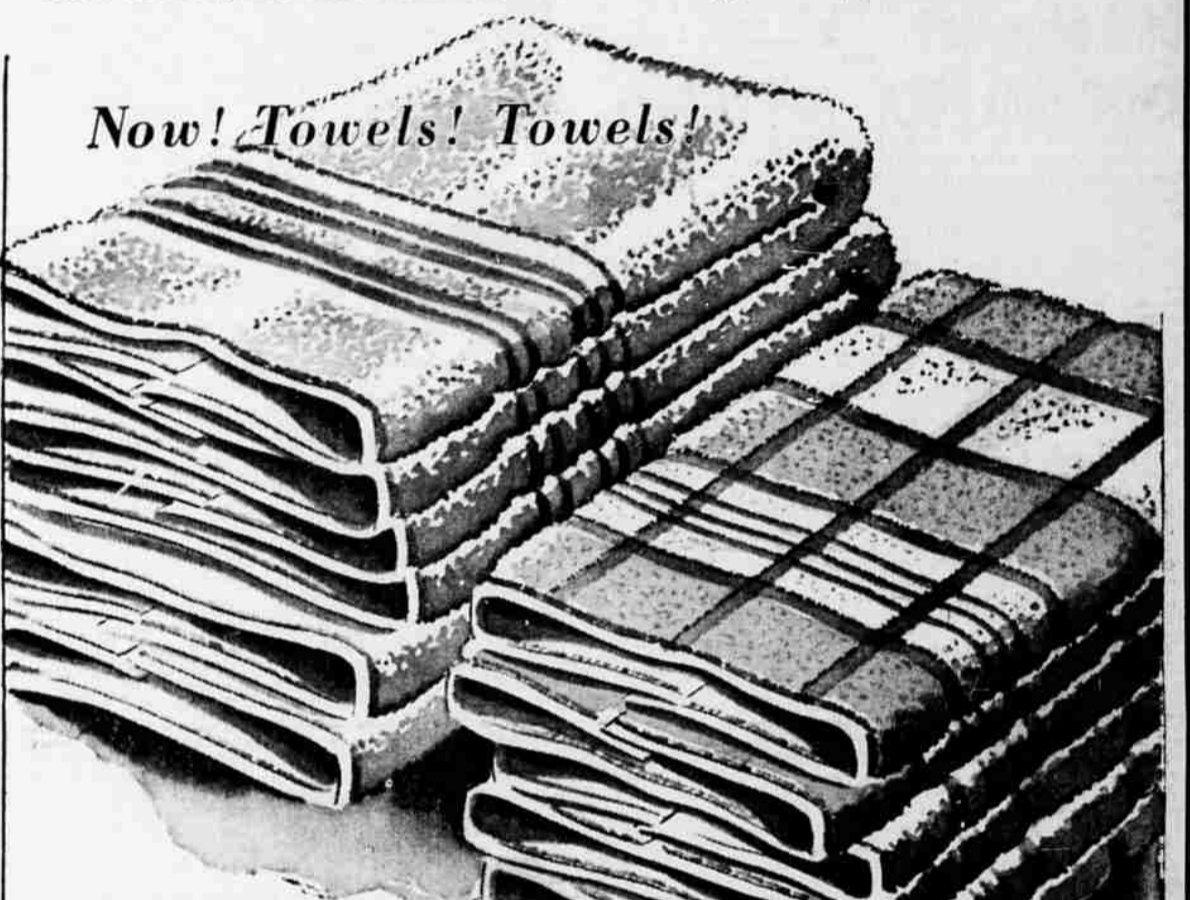

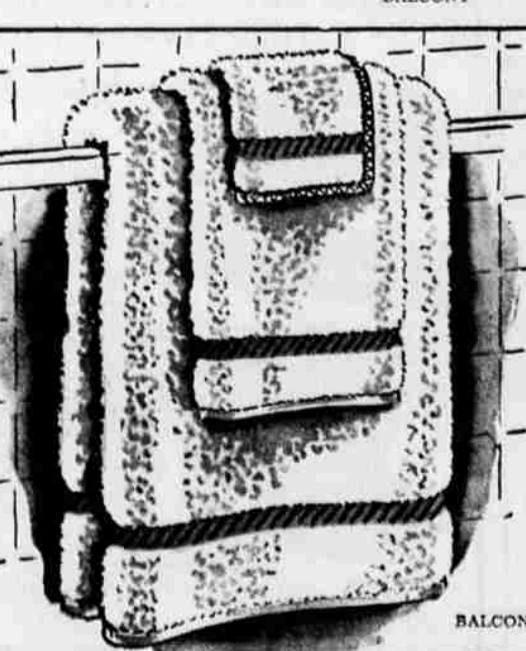
