# UN To Take Up Indian Problem

LAKE SUCCESS, Jan. 6 (AP)—The strife and bloodshed touched off by the partitioning of India officially came to the attention of the United Nations today when the security council takes up India's complaint against Pakistan, her sister dominion, over fighting in Kashmir.

The issue of Kashmir, a princely state about the size of Kansas in northernmost India, covers only the current focal point of fighting, but some observers believe that other problems of splintered India might now be aired before the UN.

British India was carved up along Moslem-Hindu lines last August 15, with most of the Moslems in Pakistan and the Hindus in India. Much of the strife has centered on which of the two countries some of the princely states with split populations should join.

Three-fourths of Kashmir's 4,000,000 are Moslems, but their ruler, Maharaja Sri Hari Singh, is a Hindu, and a tug-of-war has been under way over affiliation. India charges that Pakistan is supporting an invasion of Kashmir.

**Brief Meet**

Indications were that the first council meeting here on the subject would be brief and that full debate would be delayed pending the arrival of experts from the contending parties and from Britain. The U. S. also will have expert representation.

Pakistan asked the council for a delay in discussions to allow Foreign Minister Sir Mohammed Zafullah Khan time to reach Lake Success, and there was no apparent opposition to the appeal.

In New Delhi, the Indian government announced that Gopalashwami Iyengar, minister without portfolio and former premier of princely Kashmir, would hurry here to represent India. Britain summoned Philip Noel-Baker, minister for colonies, to Lake Success and the United States called Ray Thurston, assistant chief of the state department's division of South Asia affairs, from Washington.

The session, the first in 1948 for the 11-nation council, finds Canada, Argentina and the Soviet Ukraine taking seats for the first time, replacing Australia, Brazil and Poland, whose two-year terms have expired.

# Greek Army Opens Drive

ATHENS, Jan. 6 (AP)—National forces launched drives Monday to expand the Konitsa perimeter and clear guerrilla units from the area north and west of the town, press dispatches said.

For the first time since the communist attack on Konitsa was launched Christmas Day, no shells fell into the town yesterday. Dispatches said that from Christmas until Saturday more than 3000 artillery and mortar shells had fallen in Konitsa.

The area which government troops are attempting to clear lies between the Sarandoporos and Aoros rivers. Lykomoro Height, key rebel position only a mile from the Albanian border and north of the Sarandoporos, was captured by a commando unit after savage hand-to-hand fighting. Thirty guerrillas were killed in the passes leading to the height and another 15 on the slopes during night fighting.

# Morse Speaks For More Democracy

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 6 (AP)—Senator Wayne Morse (R-Ore.) urged passage of a bill prohibiting discrimination in employment because of race, color or religion.

He spoke at the second annual conference of the joint defense appeal here and said:

"The bill of rights gives the pattern for a practical working democracy. Every time a man is discriminated against because of race, creed or color, democracy dies a little, since intolerance and injustice strike at the very roots of democratic government."

More than 600 Jewish leaders from all parts of the nation attended the conference. They recommended a fund of \$6,104,540 in 1948 to finance activities of the American Jewish committee and the anti-defamation league.

# Hospital Patient Jumps Out Window

SEATTLE, Jan. 6 (AP)—Leaping through the closed window of a room on the third floor of the Seattle General hospital, a 42-year-old patient, Earl Johnson, suffered injuries early Monday which caused his death.

Police said his nurse, Miss Mary Moss, told them Johnson threw off an oxygen tent, struck her in the face and dove through the window, landing on the lawn below.

Johnson had been in critical condition after accidentally swallowing cleaning fluid Christmas Day, thinking it was mouth wash.

# Opening Day Is Now A Holiday

MEADVILLE, Pa., Jan. 6 (AP)—CIO employees of the Palmer Well-coil Tool company will henceforth have a new paid holiday—the opening of the Pennsylvania deer season.

Last December 1 most of the 100 employees, members of the CIO United Steelworkers, took off for the woods to get their deer and the plant had to close down.

So Robert W. Palmer, president of the firm, decided to make the holiday a formal one. "Stucks," he added with a gleam in his eye, "we like to go, too."

# Illegal Hunting Fines Handed Out

Two Ashland residents, William Wright Beagle and Jim Bernell Kerns, were fined \$29.50 each in justice court Monday after pleading guilty to hunting by illegal methods.

The federal officer who made the arrest said that the men were driving ducks with a power boat on the Klamath river. They were arrested this morning.

# Eugene Man Up For Murder

EUGENE, Jan. 6 (AP)—Stanley Charles Eubank, 60, is in the Lane county jail here, charged with first-degree murder after a drinking party here Sunday evening when he beat Eva Myrtle Sather, about 48, about the head with a hammer. The woman died at a local hospital late Sunday night following surgery.

Mrs. Ella Hileman, a neighbor, reported Mrs. Sather's injury to state police who sent her to a hospital and arrested Eubank and Garnie Walker, who informed Mrs. Hileman of the accident. Walker, who was held in jail as a material witness, had apparently been drinking with the couple before leaving the house, according to Mrs. Sather's neighbor. He was the victim's former husband and lived in a trailer house at the rear of the couple's residence.

# Reds Boycott UN Assembly

LAKE SUCCESS, Jan. 6 (AP)—The United Nations "Little Assembly" began its year-around sittings Monday with Russia and the five other Soviet bloc nations boycotting its opening session.

Secretary-General Trygve Lie, in opening the meeting at 11:25 a. m. (EST) took no official notice of the boycott but he gave his full approval to the new experimental body, originally proposed by Secretary of State Marshall.

Although ignoring the vacant seats at the huge committee table, Lie took issue with the contention expressed previously by Russia that the "Little Assembly" would undermine the security council and threaten the entire UN structure.

"I am convinced," Lie declared, "that the interim committee (Little Assembly) can make a very constructive contribution to the effectiveness of the general assembly and thereby strengthen the United Nations as a whole."

A Soviet spokesman said in advance of the session that Russia still felt the U. S.-sponsored "Little Assembly" was unconstitutional and therefore would not attend. Informed quarters said the same attitude had been taken by Czechoslovakia, Poland, Yugoslavia, White Russia and the Soviet Ukraine.

# Rates Bureau To Meet January 21

Change of name and election of officers of the organization are two matters to come before membership of the Klamath Basin Rates bureau at a meeting scheduled in the chamber of commerce board room on January 21 at 7:30 p. m.

Revision of by-laws and a progress report are other matters on the evening's business agenda, according to Margaret Santo, secretary of the bureau.

# Portland Notes Cop Shortage

PORTLAND, Jan. 6 (AP)—Not enough boys want to be cops and chase robbers, the city civil service board observed today in noting that less than 50 men applied for patrolman jobs.

The board said it had expected 200 or more applications for the January 15 tests and that the examinations might be called off and re-offered later.

The jobs available have salaries ranging from \$240 to \$270 a month.

# Church Council Protests UMT

PORTLAND, Jan. 6 (AP)—The Portland council of churches will sponsor circulation of petitions among college and high school students here protesting enactment of universal military training.

Members of a church committee voted to oppose the training program. Earl Lambert A. Beard, a veteran of both World Wars, said he favored universal training to "protect us from another stab in the back like Pearl Harbor."

# BANQUET

PORTLAND, Jan. 6 (AP)—Ray H. Brannaman, Denver, national commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, will confer in Portland Friday with state VFW officers and attend a banquet in his honor that night.

Accompanying the commander is Clyde A. Lewis, Plattburgh, N. Y., junior vice commander.

# CONTROL MEET

SALEM, Jan. 6 (AP)—The state board of control will meet today for the first time since the Christmas holidays.

Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry returned to his office Monday, while Governor John H. Hall will come back today. Both have been absent since before Christmas.

# Traffic Fines Handed Out

Traffic accidents early last night brought about three arrests by city police, all for failure to yield the right of way at intersections.

# Indian Battle Still Fomenting

KARACHI, Pakistan, Jan. 6 (AP)—A Pakistan information ministry official said Monday the dominant foreign office had prepared a comprehensive reply to India's memorandum to the United Nations security council charging Pakistan with aiding raiders in Kashmir.

It is understood the reply contains counter charges, offers evidence intended to show the Pakistani government has nothing to do with the raiders and expresses sympathy with the Kashmir people, who are predominantly Moslems.

Undeclared warfare broke out in October in Kashmir, a border state aligned by its Hindu maharajah with India.

(India's complaint is scheduled to come before the security council at Lake Success, N. Y., tomorrow.)

uniform to march in a military parade. Afterward he and his wife visited a service bar and that started Marie on a prolonged "bust."

**Five Day Uprow**

For the five days just prior to the slaying, Franklin told reporters, his wife remained intoxicated and kept his home in an uproar with her tantrums. She refused to eat or sleep and wouldn't let him sleep. Any little difficulty was sufficient to throw her into a rage.

One such instance, he said, was a sudden obsession that Marie wanted to locate some "trinkets," little souvenirs he had picked up from time to time. She ransacked the house and complained bitterly that they had been stolen by Franklin's relatives.

On Sunday, November 30, Franklin said he stayed at home with his wife to try to cheer her up. But matters didn't improve and Mrs. Franklin even ripped the wires from the sparkplugs of the family car to keep him from driving to town to get something to eat, Franklin said.

"I don't imagine I'll ever learn what she did with those wires now," Franklin said.

About 9 o'clock that night Franklin said he went to bed, but before he could get to sleep his wife called him out to look at some papers she had. Then he went back to bed, asking Marie to "Please let me sleep."

"By that time I was completely worn out. She hadn't slept or been to bed for five nights and kept me awake, too," the 54-year-old former tavern owner said.

"I heard her clattering around in the kitchen, then saw her come

# Sale Of Store Told

Russell J. Arnot of Bismarck, N. D., has purchased outright the Coast-To-Coast stores firm at 11th and Main, and is scheduled to be open for business Wednesday. At present the store is closed for inventory.

Franklin's statement to the district attorney is that he fired when his wife came through the open door with a shotgun. He kept the body in the house while digging the backyard grave, and buried Marie December 2.

In the interim, after Marie was killed and before she was buried, her body lay in a bathtub at the house and later was placed on a bed. Franklin said that while his wife's body was on the bed a local insurance man came to the house to inquire about a policy on her life which had lapsed.

Franklin said that he had just "blacked out" from weariness the night of the slaying, and after that he went on a "bust" himself.

"When I began to come out of it, he said, 'I wrote all the details to my brother in Portland. I wanted to get it over with.'"

Franklin has retained Attorney U. S. Baletine to represent him and probably will have a preliminary hearing before the grand jury convenes January 19.

The fact that the district attorney has filed the first degree murder charge indicates that Franklin's self-defense story is not believed officially. First degree murder implies malice aforethought and premeditation.
