TULELAKE—In a beautiful holiday season ceremony, Frances Frey, only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George H. Frey, became the bride on Saturday, December 27, of Richard L. Fensler. The groom is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Clark W. Fensler, and the single ring service united two pioneer families of the Tulelake community.

The service was read at 2 o'clock in St. Augustine's church, Merrill, by Father J. O. O'Connor before a large number of relatives and friends. Preceding the ceremony Mrs. E. Webb Staunton played several harp numbers, and Mrs. Ward Devlin sang "Ave Maria." The traditional wedding marches were played on the organ by Mrs. Staunton.

The bride, given in marriage by her father, wore a white slipper satin gown made with long sleeves, bustle back and seed pearl trim. Her full length veil of illusion was caught about her head with a hand-made lace mantilla brought from Paris by a great uncle nearly 90 years ago. She carried an arrangement of white carnations and stephanotis centered with a golden threaded white orchid.

Bernice Nebker, home for the holidays from the University of California, was maid of honor, and Peggy Taylor was bridesmaid. Both wore identical frocks of gold taffeta made with full skirts and fitted bodices. They carried arm bouquets of poinsettias tied with chartreuse and forest green ribbons. The same ribbon colors were used to fashion arrangements worn in their hair.

Altar and pew decor further carried out the Christmas color theme. Best man was Joe Watkins of Malin. Ushers were Tom Frey, brother of the bride, and Jack Fensler, brother of the groom. Acolytes were George Harris Frey, brother of the bride, and Robert Frey, a cousin. They also lighted the altar candles preceding the ceremony.

Mrs. Frey and Mrs. Fensler wore black ensembles with deep red rosebud corsages.

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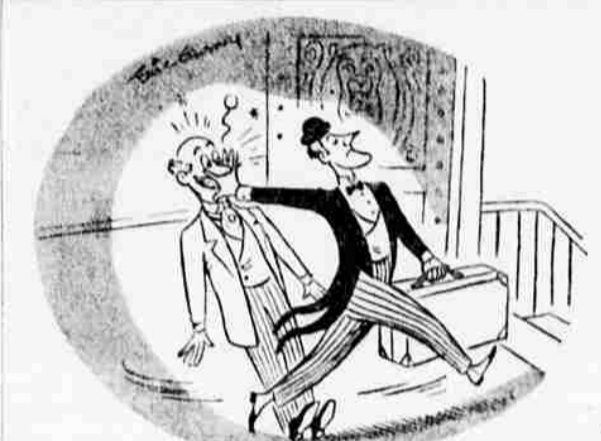
