

North-End Closures Agreed On

Little opposition was encountered by state highway officials from a group of Chelsea and Opportunity addition property owners meeting in the courthouse last night to discuss road closures in the north-end additions.

The property owners agreed to the closing of all but two streets immediately abutting the highway, and told the highway men they would, under those terms, sign the petition.

The two streets which will remain open are Quarry and D streets. D street to be open on the south side of the highway only. The previous intention of the department, apparently, was to close off all roads but Quarry street, but at last night's meeting, H. G. Smith, chief construction engineer for the state highway department, said that D street would connect with the highway on the south side. The D street entrance will "complete" what is known as the "loop-leg" route.

County Engineer Wally Hector, who was in charge of the hearing, said that the D street entrance was the main concern of the property owners, since it is the route commonly used for mail delivery as well as general communication.

The highway department is interested in eliminating as many cross streets as possible on the proposed four-lane highway. It was explained that better traffic control is effected in that way and that fewer cross streets make for fewer traffic fatalities on the thoroughfares.

Tule Firm Wins Pumping Plant Bid

George R. Stacy of Tulelake was the successful low bidder for construction of pumping plants, G. H. J. K. L. and M. Coppock bay area. Bids were opened at the U. S. bureau of reclamation office Wednesday.

Stacy's bid was \$128,375.75. Other bidders were Wickes Engineering and Construction company of Des Moines, Ia. for \$132,404.25 and C. E. Blakley of Klamath Falls for \$136,659.25.

Construction is to start as soon as ground and weather conditions are suitable.

Detective James Quinn said the man had orally admitted several local robberies. Quinn said two policemen went to a cafe yesterday where a customer was boasting he had a gun. When Patrolman Harold Franklin asked for the gun, the man replied, "Yes, copper," and then pulled the trigger, but the gun did not fire.

Allen Named To Post

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8 (AP)—President Truman today announced he is appointing George V. Allen, now ambassador to Iran, as assistant secretary of state for public affairs.

Presidential Press Secretary Charles G. Ross made the announcement for the president.

Allen, a native of Durham, N. C., will succeed William Benton, who recently resigned.

The post carries with it direction of the state department's "Voice of America" broadcasts and other foreign information programs.

Allen, 44, was understood to be Secretary of State Marshall's choice for the job.

Mr. Truman must send a formal nomination of Allen to the senate which can approve or reject his selection for the post.

Benton resigned last October 1. Since then, Holland H. Sargent, who was Benton's deputy, has been acting assistant secretary.

The "Voice of America" broadcasts had their origin during wartime.

Considerable opposition developed in congress to continuing them after the war, but much of it has died down.

There was no immediate announcement of a successor to Allen as ambassador to Iran.

Rio Police Battle Reds In Plant

RIO DE JANEIRO, Jan. 8 (AP)—Police fought today with communists attempting to publish an edition of their newspaper in the wake of congressional action withdrawing the last vestige of legality from the Brazilian communist party.

Four communists were wounded. Police broke into the printing plant, using tear gas bombs and machine-guns, when workers refused to halt presses printing an edition covering the action by the chamber of deputies last night stripping Brazilian communists, the largest communist party in the western hemisphere, of all elective posts.

President Eurica Gaspar Dutra signed the anti-communist bill in law soon after the chamber of deputies acted. Communists affected included a senator, 14 deputies, 90 state legislators and 18 members of the Rio de Janeiro city council. The senate had passed the bill previously.

Order Refused
The outbreak came when Police Inspector Fredgard Martins sought to enforce an order to close the newspaper for 15 days. He was refused admittance to the plant and returned later with 10 police. The workers were ordered to open the door.

Pistol shots from within answered the order. The 10 policemen fired pistols into the door as riot stuns shrieked. A carload of 40 red-capped shock police rolled up, armed with tommyguns. They raced toward the door under fire and sprayed the shop with bullets. Then they blasted holes in the grating through which they shot tear gas, mauling gas and asphyxiation gas. The communists inside hurled incendiary bombs

and hand grenades at the doorway, but none landed outside.

The gas took effect swiftly, and soon 20 communists staggered out. The police, now numbering about 100, arrested them as they emerged, after their five-hour siege.

Air Search On Again

Two air search parties were organized Thursday morning, the first clear day since New Year's, by Klamath Air Search and Rescue unit. Object of the search is the missing Stinson which took off from the Ellensburg, Wash., field, December 21, and which is supposed may possibly be down in this area.

One of the parties left this morning for California, in response to a report from CAA of an unidentified object allegedly seen on the side of Sims mountain. CAA got the report from Mt. Shasta CAA office.

The report was received by Mt. Shasta from the forest service officials who said three separate reports had been received by their office that an object which might be a plane had been sighted on the side of Sims mountain, between Dunsuir and Redding.

A further search of the area near Silver Lake, north of Gearhart mountain toward Beaver Marsh field was also started this morning by KASRU with two planes sent out, equipped with emergency ration and first aid kits.

KASRU officials are not satisfied with the search made in this country as the ceiling closed in before a thorough examination of the area could be made. Report of a plane being heard low in the "soup" the Sunday the Stinson was reported missing was given as the reason for further investigation of this territory. Due to ruggedness of the terrain two planes were sent on this leg of the search.

UN Ready To Start Holy Land Split

LAKE SUCCESS, Jan. 8 (AP)—After a six-week interim during which violence and bloodshed have swept across Palestine, the United Nations will get down to work tomorrow on carrying out the general assembly decision to partition the Holy Land into Jewish and Arab nations by October 1.

At 11 a. m. EST Friday Secretary-General Trygve Lie will open the first meeting of the five-nation Palestine partition commission set up by the assembly in New York November 29, when the plan to split Palestine was finally approved. The commission will elect officers and plunge into the task of working out methods for carrying out the Holy Land in the face of violent Arab opposition.

Works On Text
Lie still was working today on the text of his opening remarks. There were reports that he would issue a stern warning to delegates of the difficulties and problems ahead, along with a special plea for action to overcome opposition and violence if possible.

Members of the commission are Dr. Karel Kuscky of Czechoslovakia, Raul Diez de Medina of Bolivia, Per Federspiel of Denmark, Dr. Eduardo Morgan of Panama and Vicente J. Francisco of the Philippines. Listicky represented his country on the special assembly committee (UNSCOP).

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German Dock Strike Diverts Ships

HAMBURG, Germany, Jan. 8 (AP)—Three allied ships bound for the British zone of Germany—one of them the U. S. Lines American Veteran bearing gift packages for Germans—were diverted to other European ports today as a wildcat strike of 12,000 Hamburg stevedores entered its fourth day.

Trade union officials refused again today to back the stevedores, who are protesting against lowered rations, but assured the men they would do all possible to see that their extra food ration was maintained.
