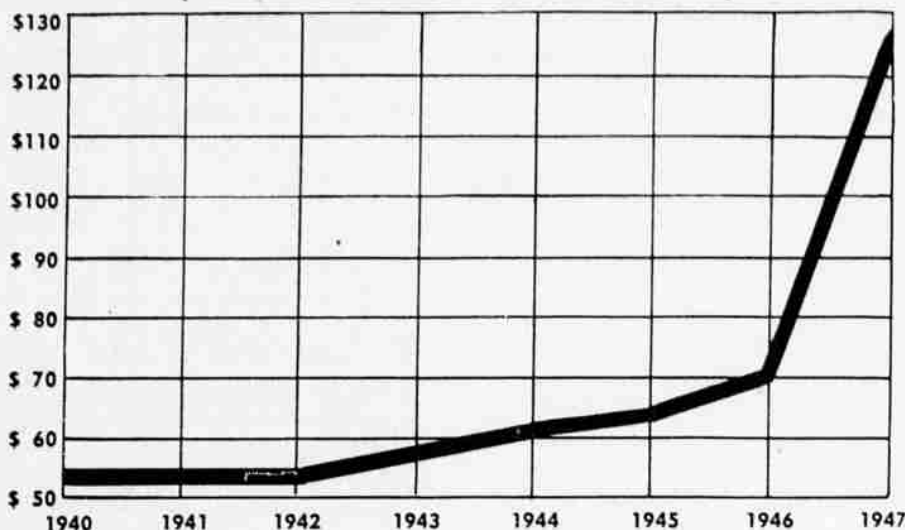

will be adjusted, with an 8c per column inch increase on local display advertising going into effect February 1, 1948. Classified word rates will remain without change.

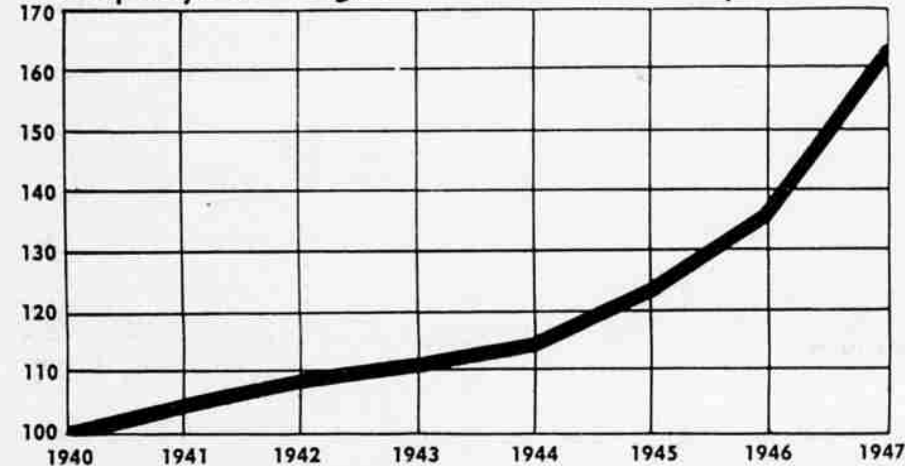
This raise, the first in three years, is necessary to keep up with increasing costs of production and more extensive circulation coverage. Increases in the three main items affecting the newspaper operation are shown below.

Newsprint Prices, in Dollars per Ton

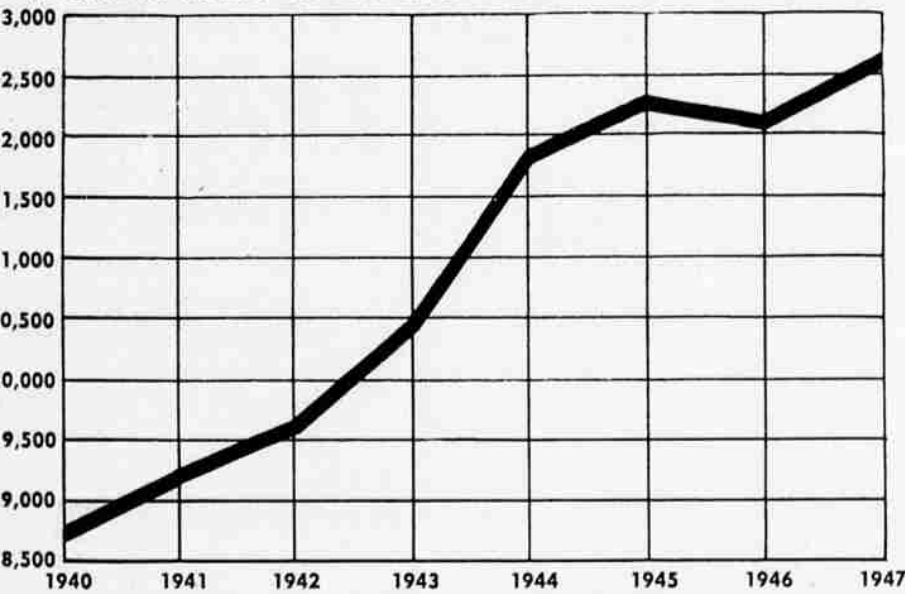


(The established price for newsprint now is \$93 per ton, but, to continue uninterrupted operation this year, The Herald and News had to buy additional paper in the open market at an excessively high price. It brought the average price of paper used in 1947 to \$127 per ton.)

Herald and News Paid Subscribers Since 1940

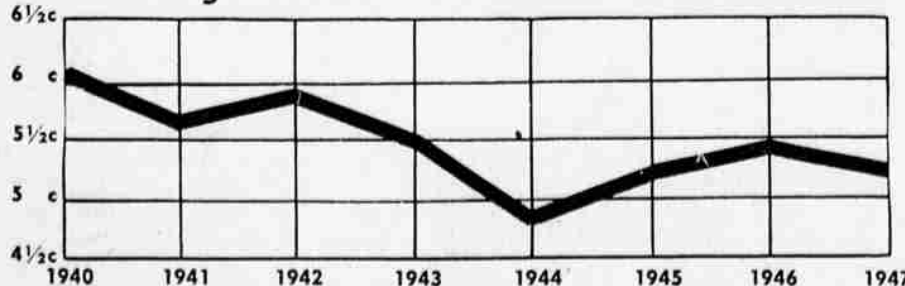


(With circulation now more than 13,000, the average for 1947 is estimated at 12,600. Acute paper shortage forced a slight decrease in 1946.)

But —with the Herald and News advertising rate schedule at a new high, the advertiser will get his money's worth because circulation also is at a new high.

The real measurement of advertising value — cost per subscriber — still will be lower in 1948 than any pre-war year. Decreases in the cost per subscriber are shown below.

(If the present circulation trend continues, paid subscribers for the year 1948 will average 13,500. With 8c added to the average advertising rate, cost per thousand subscribers will be 5 1/2c per column inch . . . the same as 1943 and lower than any previous year.)

GRAINS SHOW MINOR GAINS

CHICAGO, Jan. 9 (AP)—Soybeans and hard advanced sharply and provided most of the interest on the board of trade today. Grains added minor gains to their current upward move and set several new seasonal peaks in doing it.

Strength in cash fats and oil markets was considered responsible for the jump in soybeans and lard.

Lard advanced on reports that soap manufacturers had purchased loose lard and rendered pork fat. March, May and December oats made new seasonal peaks and the high for March oats was a record for any contract of that grain. Cash oats set a record at \$1.48 1/2 for No. 1 extra heavy red.

The record high for any oats contract, set by March just at the close, was \$1.32 1/2.

All soybean contracts closed 8 cents higher, the daily limit, with March at a record of \$4.28 1/2. Lard was 35 to 50 cents a hundred pounds higher, January \$27.97.

Grains spurted at the close and finished on the day's highs with trading active. Wheat closed 1 1/4-3/4 higher, May \$2.97 1/2-3/4, corn was 1 1/2-3/4 higher, May \$2.60-2.60 1/2, and oats were 1/2 to 1 1/4 higher, May \$1.24 1/2-3/4.

Oil Stocks Show Gains

NEW YORK, Jan. 9 (AP)—A few oils put on a bullish performance in today's stock market while many leaders elsewhere failed to respond.

In the rising section most of the day were Superior Oil of Cal, Skelly Oil, Texas Gulf Producing, Pacific Western Oil, Gulf Oil, Nickel Plate (on word the Lackawanna was buying into their railroad), Folsom Steel, Boeing, Douglas Aircraft, American Can, J. I. Case, International Harvester, and Consolidated Natural Gas.

Backward were Universal Pictures, Twentieth Century-Fox, Youngstown Sheet, Bethlehem Steel, Montgomery Ward, International Paper, Johns-Manville, Pepsi-Cola and United Air Lines.

Assorted railway bonds attracted bids. Cotton, toward the finish, was off 65 cents to up 45 cents a bale. At Chicago grains enjoyed a belated rally. Wheat ended up 1 1/4 to 3/4 cents a bushel, corn 1 1/2 to 3/4, and oats 1/2 to 1 1/4.
