Housewife Held In Extortion Case

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 9 (AP)—A 29-year-old housewife was held in jail today on a federal charge of sending an extortion letter to actress Betty Grable.

Mrs. Jane Bean was arraigned before U. S. Commissioner David B. Head yesterday and ordered held under \$1000 bond pending a hearing January 15.

Richard B. Hood, FBI chief here, said his agents arrested Mrs. Bean after a letter was written to the actress demanding \$5000 to prevent kidnapping of the younger child of Miss Grable and her husband, Bandleader Harry James.

Central Valley WASHINGTON Slated

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9 (AP)—House hearings will begin Monday on a bill to require revisions in the terms of contracts being offered by the reclamation bureau to water users in the Central valley project in California.

Among the first witnesses supporting the change will be Don McBride, secretary-manager of the National Reclamation association, and Edison Abel of the California Farm Bureau federation, Berkeley, Calif.

Chairman Rockwell (R-Colo.) of the house public lands subcommittee on irrigation and reclamation will preside.

Clay Declines German Job

BERLIN, Jan. 9 (AP)—Gen. Lucius D. Clay, U. S. military governor of Germany, said today he does not want to serve in a civilian post as high commissioner when the state department takes over administration of the U. S. occupation zone.

Secretary of State Marshall said yesterday in testimony before the senate foreign relations committee that the state department hopes to take over administration of the zone from the army June 30.

"I have no desire to serve here in any capacity except military," Clay told a reporter. He recalled he had asked for permission to retire from the army in 1948.

The estate of Fred E. Daniel, who died intestate New Year's day, was estimated at \$6500 real and personal property, and that of William McCampbell, whose death occurred December 22, was estimated at \$2000.

Busses Going Through Here

Greyhound busses, northbound to Portland from southern points, continued to be routed through Klamath Falls as workmen were attempting to repair the South Umpqua river bridge which buckled early this week as the South Umpqua flooded its banks.

The Pacific highway was open to light traffic but trucks and busses were not permitted to go through and were using the Klamath Falls route. Passenger cars over the South Umpqua were using an old route for a detour, the state highway advised.

In the meantime, the Klamath Falls Greyhound office had worked out a highly satisfactory schedule and although employees were still doing a terrific business they reported the set-up as "smooth." Busses were being "stubbed" as far north as Myrtle Creek, south of Roseburg, and from the north, busses were running from Portland to Roseburg but not beyond.
