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New Air Service Slated

Air parcel post service between the United States and Europe, Africa, Middle East and Near East will soon be inaugurated, according to Postmaster General Jesse M. Donaldson.

Points where agreements are hoped for for this service are the United Kingdom, Continental Europe, Bermuda, Newfoundland, Azores, Iceland, Senegal, G. O. Coast, Belgian Congo, Union of South Africa, Algeria, Tunisia, Egypt, Palestine, Saudi Arabia, Syria and India.

Moving the mails by the most expeditious means available is the postal service policy, Donaldson said, and as soon as ratification of agreements with foreign countries is completed, dates for service will be worked out and announced.

Second Paratrooper Found In Alaska

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, Jan. 13 (AP)—The frozen body of the second of three paratroopers who vanished after jumping to the aid of six B-29 crash survivors north of Nome December 27, was found Saturday by an Eskimo dog team driver. Ladd field authorities said today.

Identity of the victim, found seven miles from the bomber's wreckage, was not disclosed. The third paratrooper, the pilot and the navigator of the wrecked plane still are missing. An aerial and dog team search is being continued.
