

Arab Attack On Jewish Village Told

JERUSALEM, Jan. 14 (AP)—Arabs attacked four Jewish settlements in the area between Jerusalem and Hebron today, Jewish sources reported, and tension mounted with reports from Syria that Middle East Arabs have set February 15 as D-Day for military sweep against Zionism.

Snipers' guns barked constantly in Jerusalem and in the area of all-Jewish Tel Aviv and all-Arab Jaffa. Jaffa is thronged with Syrians, Iraqi and Trans-Jordanians awaiting officials to move against Tel Aviv.

These columns were reliable sources said three columns of Arabs attacked Ain Turin, near Hebron, with grenades and automatic weapons. Jewish reports said the Arabs also attacked the neighboring collective villages of Cikib Revadim, Masuoth Izhak and Kfar Etzion. They said the first band of attackers was comprised of 15 men; the second, about 30. A third band struck from the direction of Jerusalem, the reports said.

On the Bethlehem-Hebron road a motor car of the Iraqi consulate was attacked and the driver and the driver's wife were reported injured. The consul himself was not in the car. Police quoted one of the pair as saying some of the attackers were "in what appeared to be army uniforms." Jewish sources expressed belief the car was mistaken for Arabs for a Jewish-owned vehicle.

In Damascus, Syrian defense minister Ahmed Sharabi said a trained Arab people's army would launch a Palestine attack against Zionism in the next month "with men and arms, in an honorable war to preserve the rights of our Arab brothers."

Employment Hits Seasonal Low Over Klamath County

Employment which had reached a seasonal low in the Klamath basin in December, 1947, has continued downward in January, officials of the state employment office said today.

This unemployment is due primarily to shutdown of logging operations and sawmills because of the winter weather. H. S. Milne, assistant manager, said.

There are 100 unemployed at Chiloquin and about 60 at Bly, nearly all men, Milne said, and the majority of these are logging workers.

Due to the unemployment situation in these outlying communities a new service is being established by the Klamath Falls office, making a visit each week to take registrations for unemployment compensation and to advise of new jobs available, saving these out of work a trip into town.

Men in the employment office will be in Chiloquin in the library Wednesday each week from 9 a. m. until noon until the situation eases, Milne said. They will visit Schmitz's store in Healy at 9 a. m. on Thursdays and be at Jack's place in Bly at 12:30 the same day.

Some mills have indicated they may reopen operations in February and with construction slated to pick up, the situation is expected to be relieved in another month. After that some farming operations should be under way.

Plans have been made for the early construction of a 25-unit motel in Klamath Falls. The Standard

SP Doesn't Want Beaches

PORTLAND, Jan. 14 (AP)—The Southern Pacific company today bowed out of the controversy over Oregon beaches, asserting it does not want the tidelands.

The company had been read into the controversy by Ex-Gov. Oswald West, who said the railroad could claim Lincoln county beaches by virtue of purchase of a long-defunct minor railroad line 40 years ago.

This came as news to the firm, but after investigation A. T. Mercier, company president, said in a statement released here that Southern Pacific did not want the lands and offered a formal release or quitclaim to settle title.

West brought in the railroad when he was fighting the state's asserted right to dig industrial sand from the beaches.

Old Sandy To Stay On Job

CHICAGO, Jan. 14 (AP)—Old Sandy will be leaving traffic at busy State and Madison streets for another month or two—and sentimental Chicagoans are glad.

Sandy, 49 other horses of the mounted police, were expected, by this time, to be replaced by new three-wheeled motorcycles. However, of 82 cycles on order, only two have been delivered.

When the temporary reprieve ends, Sandy and his mates will be retired to the Bridewell farm, if previous practice is followed.

But, asks Capt. Ted Crogan, chief of the traffic police: "How are you going to keep them down on the farm after they've seen State street?"

Olympia Rent Hike Refused

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14 (AP)—Housing Expeditor Tigue E. Woods announced today he has rejected the recommendation of the local rent advisory board at Olympia, Wash. (Thurston county) for a general rent increase of 15 per cent.

Tigue said he had advised the board that the denial was "without prejudice" to its right to submit a new recommendation with appropriate substantiation.

The denial, he said, was made on the ground that "appropriate substantiating evidence" had not been supplied.

The alumni said President H. K. Newburn had advised that architects would be authorized this month to proceed with plans. Haycox said the committee had funds or pledges for \$1,300,000, just \$100,000 short of the minimum needed for the long-planned student center structure.

The building was first proposed in 1923.

Kuter Says He Won't Quit

MONTREAL, Jan. 14 (AP)—Maj. Gen. Lawrence S. Kuter said today he had no intention of resigning from the U. S. air forces in order to serve as chairman of the civil aeronautics board.

Kuter, U. S. representative to the international civil aviation organization, is President Truman's choice for chairman of the CAB. The senate yesterday against a bill which would let Kuter retain his military pay and rank while serving on the board.

"I have no intention of resigning from the air force," Kuter said.

Redwood Lumber Battle Still On

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 14 (AP)—The redwood operators' committee declared today on the second anniversary of a strike against eight redwood manufacturing companies that those firms are employing more men and producing more lumber than before the walkout.

The statement said the strike by the AFL lumber and sawmill workers' union against eight leading redwood companies "is believed to constitute a record for the duration of a labor dispute for any major industry in the country."

It said the last negotiations took place in March, 1947 and that the only remaining issue is the operators' refusal to grant a union shop.

CHICAGO, Jan. 14 (AP)—Dr. Artur Rodzinski, one of the nation's leading musical conductors who became musical director of the Chicago symphony orchestra less than a year ago, has been dismissed by the orchestral association.

A statement given at a press conference by Cyrus H. Adams, association vice president, said that differences of opinion between Rodzinski and the association's board of trustees "make it clearly evident that his further connection with the orchestra and with the board of trustees cannot be satisfactory."
