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## Teen-Age Club Functioning Again On Full Schedule

The Klamath Falls Teen-Age club for Klamath Union high school and Sacred Heart academy students in the teen-age bracket, was functioning again with a full-time director, Bill Procter, taking over his duties as of January 1.

Procter, named by the senior council chairman Matt Finnigan, said today that efforts were being made to obtain a building, centrally located, which will put all teen-age activities under one roof. At the present time affairs of the club are scattered. On Monday nights there is a dancing class conducted in the Moose hall. On Wednesday nights temporary arrangements have been made for teen-age dances in the armory. Thursday nights, from 8 to 10 p. m., the club has swimming privileges at the plunge. There is a charge of 25 cents per person for these activities. On Saturday night dances are given in the Legion hall at Veterans Memorial building with a 50-cent per head charge. Baldy Evans' orchestra plays and plans fall for a 10:30 to 11 p. m. broadcast over KPLW.

The council in cooperation with the city recreational department has its eye on a building which may possibly be available for teen-age use. If and when the building is obtained, Procter said, the program will start full time, opening at 3:30 p. m. daily except Sundays and operating through to 10 p. m. except on Saturday nights when the rooms will be open until 12 midnight.

The program goes further, Procter said, as summer activities are planned. This program will include outdoor activities including the establishment of a pee-wee golf course, archery range and water sports. When the building is obtained the council hopes that all teen-agers will use the facilities.

At the present time, two councils are officiating, the senior council and the junior council, the latter comprised of one representative from each home room, club and class at both KUHS and the academy. Bob Mahoney is president.

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## Swimming Pool Plan Kicked Off

A swimming pool project for Klamath Falls and the surrounding community is in the wind these days, but as yet has not progressed to the point where anyone can get his feet wet.

The pool may be some years distant, but over a period of time the plan is for a swimming place, gymnasium, auditorium and general recreation center to be built on the city-owned land near the corner of Main and Mortimer. The pool would come first.

At the city hall yesterday afternoon the newly-appointed community plunge commission—composed of city councilmen, city recreation committee, a citizens' group and a delegation representing the Elks lodge—met and elected John Schubert chairman of the commission.

Plans eyed Several plans for a recreation center were talked over briefly, but it was tentatively decided that it would be more feasible to construct a pool first and let the rest wait until later. Sam Smith, city recreation director, estimated the cost of

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an open-air plunge at about \$70,000, a closed pool for not less than \$100,000.

The money would have to come from gifts, solicitations and what amount the city recreation fund can chip in.

Schubert last night presented the matter to the Elks lodge, carrying a request that the lodge assume sponsorship of the plunge as a community project. The lodge has reserved a decision until later.

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
