

# Pels Trounce Black Tornado IN 45-25 Rout

## Ashland's Defeat By Cavemen Puts Klamath Out Front

Last night the Pelicans took a lead in district 4 high school basketball that can't be called anything less than commanding, shelling the red-clad Medford Black Tornado 45 to 25 on the Klamath Union high school court, while the other heretofore undefeated squad in the circuit, Ashland, went 20 points in debt to Grants Pass, 39-39.

Klamath Falls now has three wins and no losses in the district. Ashland has two and one, Grants Pass one and two, Medford—to the extreme unhappiness of the backers of the Tornado—nothing and three.

The two combinations get together again tonight, here and at Grants Pass.

The Tornado last night led through most of a battling first half and really threatened to make a game of it in the Klamath-Medford fashion, and it was by way of some excellent sharpshooting on the part of Klamath's Don Zarosinski that the Pels stayed even with the boys from the valley.

**FIVE-POINT LEAD**  
At one time in the second quarter the Tornado had forced to a five-point lead, 15-10, but Zarosinski came in for three baskets and a foul shot to help put the Pels in a 20-17 lead at halftime.

A free toss by Ed Whitney tied the score at 17-17, Zarosinski put Klamath in the lead with a post shot from the key circle and Bob Barnes added a foul shot to end the scoring for the first half.

A capacity crowd of somewhere around 1500 persons saw a tight, rough ball game those first two quarters.

But when the Tornado came out for the third period it apparently neglected to bring its offensive out of the locker room, and its defense was worn thin.

Medford managed only eight points—three buckets and two free tosses—in the entire second half.

By the end of the third quarter the Pelicans were completely in control of everything, even getting a gift shot when a technical foul was called on the Medford coach, Bob Hamilton. Official Parker Hess happened to chance by in time to over-hear something Hamilton said from the bench and promptly penalized the young Medford melior.

Score at the end of the third quarter was 30-22 for Klamath.

**SCORING RECORD**  
Don Zarosinski was hot last night, scoring 19 points on six baskets and seven foul shots, while big Tom Mottern was the most effective Tornado shooter with nine points. Zarosinski's total set a team record for tallying this season.

In last night's preliminary game the Klamath Jayvees ran into no trouble at all subduing the Medford junior varsity, 37 to 23. Skippy Johnson scored 14 Klamath points.

Tonight's opening tilt will feature the Merrill Huskies against the local junior varsity, starting at 7 p. m.

SEATTLE, Jan. 17 (AP)—Clarence S. (Hec) Edmundson, Washington's basketball coach 27 years until his retirement last spring, was honored last night, but the Washington State basketball five put a crimp in the observance.

The big athletic pavilion was dedicated to "Hec," but Washington State won the basketball game 48 to 47.

Edmundson's successor, Art McLarney, saw his charges out in front at halftime 26 to 21 but the cross-staters put on a last-half drive which overtook Washington. WSC pulled ahead to 37 to 31 and the Huskies crept up but never closed the gap.

Dead-eye shooting and the WSC stout defense turned the tide. Jack Nichols, Washington center, scored 19 points for his third conference game in a row, sinking seven of seven free throws. Three Washington State men, Ed Gayda, George Hamilton and Bob Elliott each scored eight.

The teams met again tonight and Oregon visits Corvallis for a clash with league-leading Oregon State.

# Uncle Sam's Athletes Will Have Trouble In Olympics

NEW YORK, Jan. 17 (NEA)—While conceding that Uncle Sam would have real trouble in the Olympic 1500-meter foot race and distances of more than that, Americans have been sure in the belief that their heroes still would outscore the rest of the world in the international championships in London next summer.

Speaking at the New York track writers' luncheon at the New York Athletic club, however, Coaches Jim Kelly of Minnesota and Carl Olson of Pittsburgh practically stunned listeners when they declared that we would be fortunate to win any flat race above the 100.

Kelly and Olson took separate Yankee all-star squads through Europe last summer.

Some of the menaces mentioned were Macdonald Bailey of England in the sprints, Herb McKenley of Jamaica in the 400, and Jamaica's Art Wint, New Zealand's Doug Harris and a flock of Swedes in the 800. Also mentioned was Scotland's high jumper, Alan Patterson.

"I don't think the 'overfed' Americans will have any picnic with the 'starving' Europeans," declared Olson.

"Mentioning feed," added Kelly, "none of the European athletes I saw looked starved."

The Columbus council K. of C. meet in a Brooklyn armory, which already had reported most of its tickets gone, was assured of a complete sellout when it was announced that McKenley would start in the 500-yard run. Herb, currently recognized as the world's fastest quarter-miler, entered when he was able to postpone his flight to Australia until January 15.

Lined up to oppose McKenley were the New York Pioneer's Roscoe Browne, Fordham's Hal McDowell and the N. Y. Police Sport's association's Fred Sicking.

The National Collegiate Track Coaches association, meeting in New York, received a recommendation from one of its committees that the NCAA track and field championships at Minnesota this spring, designated a semi-final Olympic try-out, be programmed generally along the lines of the Olympic games.

If approved, the events would be run at metric distances instead of yards, tests up to 400 meters would be run entirely in lanes, and such events as the 400-meter hurdles, 3000-meter steeplechase, the hop-step-and-jump and 16-pound hammer would be added.

The 200-meter low hurdles, a non-Olympic event, would still be kept on the program.

# Howard Odell Huskies' New Gridiron Boss

## Yale Mentor Out To Coast Circuit On Year Contract

SEATTLE, Jan. 17 (AP)—Jimmy Phelan made it. Pest Welch made it. Now Howard "Howie" Odell, fresh from Yale, has signed with the University of Washington and hit the rocky road of Pacific Coast conference football, which leads the good and the lucky to the Rose Bowl.

Quiet, personable Howie signed with the university yesterday—surprising nobody as the Seattle sports writers had put the finger on him several days ago.

The man who put Yale back on the football map did not sound off with any wild predictions as to what he was going to do at Washington and to the rest of the conference. Washington was expecting no miracle from the 37-year-old mentor, but was remembering how Clark Shaughnessy came out of the Midwest nowhere to pilot the Stanford model-T to fame.

Odell, too, comes out of that Middle West football belt.

**GRADUATE OF PITT**  
He was a high school star in Sioux City, Ia., and attended Pitt when Pittsburgh U. was a gridiron gargantuan. He held assistantships at Pitt, Harvard, Pennsylvania and Wisconsin before moving to Yale as the second non-alumnus ever to boss the Bulldogs.

Washington has not been rough on its coaches in recent years, although its all-time record is 17 mentors in 58 seasons. Jimmy Phelan boiled in from Purdue in 1930 and lasted a dozen years. The man he brought with him as assistant, Ralph (Pest) Welch, took over and coached six Washington teams, sending his 1943 outfit to the bowl of the roses.

One Phelan team went to the bowl, in 1936. Before them, Enoch Bagshaw, who moved up from the coaching job at nearby Everett high school, went to the Rose Bowl in 1924 and 1926.

Bad seasons finally caught up with all three.

With an enrollment which touched 15,990 the fall quarter, Washington now has definite "big time" athletic ambitions.

Odell's right-hand man at Yale was Line Coach Reggie Root, a former full-time football coach there, but Odell said today he had made no commitments as to his assistants. Caswell asked him to "gather together as strong a coaching staff as possible."

**ONE-YEAR TRIAL**  
His agreement is for one year, with salary not announced.

"If I can't produce a satisfactory team, then I don't want to be tied to a long-term contract and I don't want the university to feel obligated," Odell said.

"But with the top caliber high school material available in Washington and throughout the Northwest, I feel certain I can field a representative team."

# Lavern Roach Called Middleweight Comer

NEW YORK, Jan. 17 (AP)—Lavern Roach, the "rookie of the year" in 1947 is established today as a Madison Square Garden headline who may draw a \$100,000 gate in a proposed bout with Marcel Cerdan.

Although the 21-year-old marine veteran from Plainview, Texas never had appeared as a pro in the big eighth avenue arena before last night, most of the 11,224 fans who saw him beat Tony Janiro in a good 10-rounder went away singing his praises.

Despite the enthusiasm of the fans, many of the veteran fight crowd thought Roach still had a long stretch of hard work ahead before he deserved to be tabbed a contender. They apparently were thinking that the Janiro of last night was far from the Janiro they had come to know.

Roach, a rugged two-fisted battler at 155½ pounds, absorbed Tony's best shots and kept coming back for more. He bloodied Janiro's nose in the first and continued to draw red throughout the scrap.

Roach now has an 18-fight win streak going. His only loss in 24 scraps as a pro was to Artie Towne on January 28, 1946. For the youthful Janiro it was the fifth loss in 68 fights.

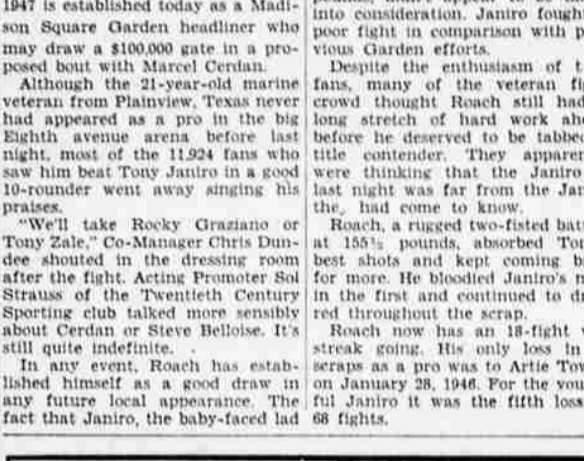

# Lujack Reported On Chicago Bears' Pay

NEW YORK, Jan. 17 (AP)—The scramble between the National football league and the rival All-America conference for the season's college plums reached a new pitch today with this question predominant: Do the Chicago Bears have Johnny Lujack, or don't they?

A report from Chicago last night—a copyrighted story by the Tribune—said the Bears' George Halas had the All-America Irish star signed, sealed and ready for delivery.

The newspaper added with a ring of authenticity that Lujack had inked a Bear contract two weeks ago for \$18,000 a year and a \$5000 bonus.

But Halas, meeting with NFL directors here, only smirked anticipatory chops and remarked: "I wish it were true, but it isn't."

In South Bend, Ind., Lujack said, "I have not yet signed." He stated he had been approached by representatives of both the Bears and the All-America Chicago Rockets, who plucked his name in the annual draft, and added: "I plan to sign with a team soon."

Halas, coach and president of the Bears, disclosed he plans to confer with the Notre Dame backfield wizard Wednesday and "it will be either on or off then."

This gave rise to speculation that the Bears may already have Lujack in the pocket and are planning to make a big splash of his formal signing at the scheduled conference.

Other reports had a representative of the All-America conference in South Bend dangling "fatihorns" offers under the noses of Lujack and his teammates, Tackles George Connor and Zygwie Zarobski.

Lujack admitted he had talked with R. E. Garn, Chicago bond broker who is a prospective purchaser of the Rocket franchise, but didn't disclose what sort of an offer had been made.

Named to aid Layne in the West's backfield were Jake Leicht of Oregon, Gordon Gray of Southern California, and Joe Perry of Alameda naval base.

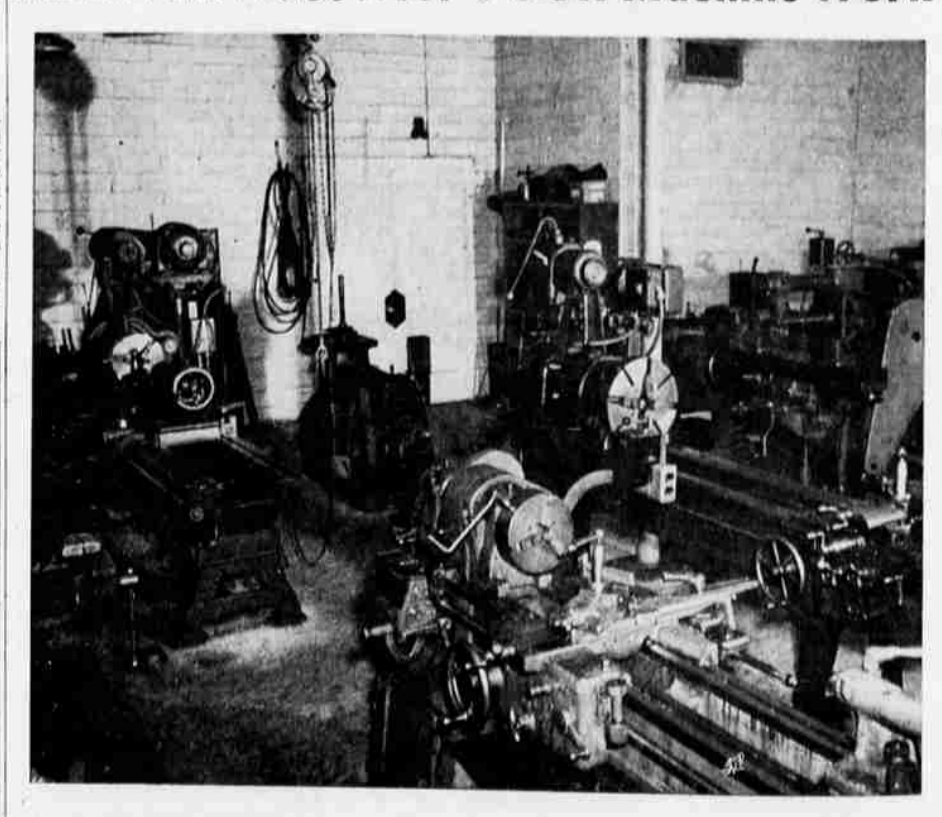
With Minisi in the East's backfield were Bob Smith of Iowa, Jug Girard of Wisconsin and Bill Luongo of Penn.
