Big Timber Sale Hearings Open

PORTLAND, Jan. 17 (AP)—The forest service will sell February 9—having expected developments—32,000,000 feet of timber to the Simpson Logging company, Shelton, Wash., under its 190-year cooperative sustained yield agreement with the firm.

The agreement calls for all timber in the public-private tract to be sold to the Simpson company.

The forest service said if the state of Washington, Grays Harbor county or any persons with a "reasonable interest" asked a hearing by January 22, such a hearing would be held at Olympia on February 9 before the sale is completed.

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 17 (AP)—Closing night life spots where immorality flourishes by revocation of liquor licenses was proposed Thursday by the state assembly in a committee on public morals.

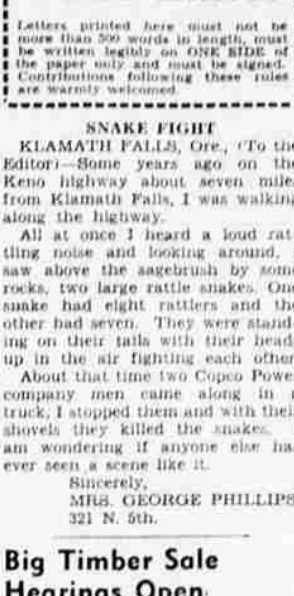

The two elements that affect the cost of newspaper advertising that are entirely within the paper's control are circulation and rate. Put together, circulation and rate give cost per subscriber.

The average local display advertising rate in 1947 was 66.1c per column inch. Add 8c, for the new rates February 1, and the average rate is 74.1c.

Net paid circulation grew from 12,287 subscribers a year ago to 13,130 today. The average for 1948 is estimated at 13,500.

The average rate of 74.1c per column inch applied to 13,500 subscribers gives an average rate of 5 1/2c per thousand subscribers for 1948.

A yearly comparison of the average rate per thousand subscribers is shown below. Note that the 1948 rate will be up to that of 1943, but will be LESS THAN ANY PREVIOUS YEAR!
