Central States Hit By Cold

The coldest weather of the winter season numbed the central sections of the country today—with temperatures dipping to a low of 36 below in Minnesota—as snow, freezing rain and sleet hit sections of the South and Southwest.

The ice belt of sub-zero temperatures extended from the Dakotas to Northern Minnesota and Northern Illinois and minimums in many communities were the lowest in the past few years.

The nation's coldest area was Northwestern Minnesota, where the thermometer plummeted to 36 below at Bemidji. At Pembina, N. D., it registered —35 and in Grand Forks the low was —30, the same biting cold was reported at Land o' Lakes, Wis. Other below zero readings included 28 at Waau and Park Falls, Wis.; 26 at Duluth, Minn.; 25 at Alexandria, Minn.; 25 at International Falls, Minn.; 19 at Green Bay, Wis.; 16 at Minneapolis and 15 at Milwaukee.

Crawford In Water Office

LAKEVIEW, Jan. 17—Tom Crawford took over his duties Thursday as manager for Lakeview Water Users, Inc., and the retiring manager, John Hanson, assumed his new duties with White Pine Lumber company here at the same time.

Between now and March 15 Crawford will spend his time between the irrigation district here and Oregon State college at Corvallis, where he is completing his studies for a degree in soils engineering, which is primarily concerned with irrigation. Hanson had no comment on his position other than to say that he will be located with the Lakeview plant at least for the present. He resigned from the irrigation district to join the White Pine firm.

SP Engineer Retires

Frank Hanna, Southern Pacific engineer of Dunsmuir, Calif., made his last run on passenger train 15 from Klamath Falls to Dunsmuir December 31, retiring after 41 years of service with the company.

Hanna has spent several days since then visiting in Klamath Falls. He began his work with SP as a fireman in 1906, working out of Sacramento, Calif. He worked in Sparks, Nev., and several years ago in Klamath Falls. He was promoted to engineer in March of 1917, and since that time has lived in Dunsmuir. A large number of his friends were on hand to welcome him on his return from his last run, and the Dunsmuir Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen presented him with a gift.

Hanna is unmarried and plans to remain in Dunsmuir for the present, although his future plans are indefinite.

Lake Planes Asked To Register In CAP

LAKEVIEW, Jan. 17—An urgent need for the registering of all local aircraft with the Lakeview flight, civil air patrol, has been broadcast by Maj. Jess Fahs, CAP command officer. Also, all local fliers are asked to enlist with the CAP as flight officers for search and rescue activities.

No obligation whatsoever is incurred as to training, instruction work, attendance at meetings or financial outlay, advises Fahs. No uniforms are required nor is there any involvement with military service. Enlistment of fliers and registration of planes is needed to prepare the search and rescue unit in case of emergency.

Homestead Queries Mount

Some anxious homestead applicants are bringing their completed forms into the reclamation bureau, not trusting the mails to get them in by deadline next Tuesday.

The mails are daily becoming heavier with returned application forms for the 44 homesteads to be allotted in the Coppock bay area of Northern California. They must be in by January 20 to qualify. Of the 15,689 application forms issued, 3312 have been returned completed. A. D. Harvey, agriculturist in charge of the homestead office, stated today. Of these 188 arrived Friday.

Two of the men who came in person to return their applications Friday found some points were not complete and left for home in Central valley, California, by plane immediately to get the information that was lacking. They intended to use airmail to get their applications back to the office by Tuesday.

Opening of the homestead lands has drawn interest from all over the United States and its territories. One request was received from Guam for an application form.

After Tuesday no more applications will be accepted and work of screening the completed forms will occupy the homestead office staff.

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New Office Gets Okay

LAKEVIEW, Jan. 17 — In joint session with the Lakeview water commission, the town council last Friday night put the finishing touches to plans for a new office, that of supervisor of town works, which will be administered by Walter Dykeman jointly with duties as supervisor for the water commission.

Dykeman, who is chairman of the water commission, is employed as supervisor by both agencies, his duties dating as of last January 1. He had already taken over his duties in anticipation of the action by the council and the water commission.

As regards his supervisory work for the commission, Dykeman replaces Fred Fisher whose resignation was accepted last week by the water board. Fisher had been supervisor of the water system for more than 20 years, since his connection with that work pre-dated purchase of the system from Sol Rehart.

Angell Pledges GOP Budget Cuts

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17 (AP)—Rep. Angell (R-Ore.) said today the republicans in control of the house will eliminate from the president's \$39,790,000,000 budget "every item that can be cut without injury to effective administration."

He indicated that the \$11,000,000,000 total in the budget for national defense might be approved. "It is felt by most thoughtful Americans that in this critical period with unrest rampant throughout the world and Russia refusing to cooperate in a peace program," Angell said in a statement, "that we should keep our powder dry."

Eisenhower Name In Oregon Primary

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 17 (AP)—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's name will be on the Oregon republican preferential primary ballot May 21 in challenge to Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, already filed, a supporter of the general for president said today.

Peter Alport, public relations representative for Oregon's "Draft Eisenhower" group, said petitions would be circulated as soon as the general retires from the army to become president of Columbia university. One thousand signatures are needed in the absence of the candidate's own declaration.

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
