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Attendance Record Set In Parks

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19 (AP)—Forest service people are about ready to proclaim that the recreational areas on federal timberlands entertained more people last year than in any previous 12 months.

In 1946 they figured 18,240,677 visits for a record, just over the peak year of 1941, which saw 18,004,785 visits recorded.

Indications are, the forest service people say, that the 1947 figures will be the best yet.

Generally speaking, recreational use of the forests is all for free, though there are lodges, resorts and hotels, as well as sports aids, such as ski lifts, operated by private individuals, and for which a charge is made. The operators pay the government for their permits.

California timberlands attracted most visitors in 1946, 3,991,920.

Texas, its rival in size, was in the middle group with only 71,000 visitors but the explanation is simple: Most of the national forests were created from public land and when these reserves were authorized, as now, most of the public land was in the West—also most of the timber. In recreational interest, Utah was second.

Pennsylvania, Michigan and South Carolina represented the non-Western states in the top 10, which included these others: Colorado, Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Arizona and Wyoming.

There are 4537 improved recreation areas in the forests and there are forests in 41 states.

Dairymen are invited to come and take part in the discussion. The Dairymen's association was organized some years ago to foster the dairy industry of the Klamath basin and it is believed that the best

method for rebuilding the local dairy industry is through a strong dairymen's association.

H. P. Ewalt, extension dairymen, from Oregon State college, will be present at the meeting to help with the discussion.
