Wheat Leads Grain Futures Up

CHICAGO, Jan. 20 (AP)—Wheat led grain futures higher today at the board of trade under persistent commission house buying said to reflect government purchases of cash grain until profit cashing declined toward the close.

The commodity credit corporation announced 1,983,700 bushels of wheat were purchased here and in Kansas City from noon Friday to Monday night.
