

Republican Confidence For '48 Victory Soars In Path Of Wallace Gains

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20 (AP)—Republican national committeemen professed growing confidence today that inroads into the democratic vote by Henry A. Wallace this fall will help elect a GOP president for the first time in 20 years.

Bricker Confident
Senator Bricker of Ohio, the republican vice presidential nominee in 1944, told the same banquet meeting "we are going to nominate a president in June."

Mrs. St. George cautioned the gathering it would be unwise to rely too strongly on the Wallace candidacy for victory and said the GOP must pin its faith on "the principles of republicanism."

But some members of the national committee said frankly if privately that they expect the Wallace vote to make the difference in their state.

One committee member who asked not to be quoted by name said he is impressed by the percentage of votes recorded in Wallace's favor in private polls taken in his state.

He said he has no doubt that if Wallace maintains this percentage in November the republican nominee, no matter who, will win.

Bricker, who is supporting his Ohio senate colleague, Robert A. Taft, for the nomination, told the national committee that it is all right to say that politics should end at the water's edge in a bi-partisan foreign policy.

But before that point is reached, Bricker said, the republicans should make certain that the nation's foreign policy is thoroughly discussed and understood by the people of the United States.

Senator Knowland of California, a supporter of his state's Gov. Earl Warren for the nomination, said in another speech the republicans in congress must join a program for rehabilitation of the 16 nations of Western Europe which are outside the communist orbit.

Seattle Egg Price Still Dropping

SEATTLE, Jan. 20 (AP)—Wholesale egg prices dropped one to three cents a dozen today, following yesterday's decrease of three to five cents, for the sharpest two-day dip of the season.

Butter prices were unchanged, but trade sources predicted a decrease within the next few days in the wake of a drop of four to five cents in the New York market today.
