## Police Probe Murder Plot

COLUMBUS, O., Jan. 23 (AP)—Kay Francis, the actress, became seriously ill under mysterious circumstances today and her stage manager, Howard Graham, 37, was booked at police headquarters "for investigation of assault to kill."  
 Miss Francis and Graham were here with the stage production, "State of the Union."  
 Miss Francis was removed early today from her hotel (Deslier-Wallick) to White Cross hospital, which described her condition as "just fair." She was still unconscious several hours after her arrival there.  
 Police said Graham, taken into custody at the hospital, asserted Miss Francis summoned him to her hotel room and said she had taken some sleeping tablets. She had been severely burned, he added, when she fell against a radiator.  
 Detective Karl Hans and Police Sgt. Carl Clifton said they found evidence of a "wild party" in the hotel room.

## Newby Clamps Down On Drivers

SALEM, Jan. 23 (AP)—Secretary of State Earl T. Newby said today his department is starting a special campaign against motor vehicle drivers who have more than their share of accidents.  
 He said any motorist with three or more accidents within any 12 months will have his record placed in a special file. Later reports then would be checked carefully, and the driver's license would be suspended if circumstances warrant.

## Soviet Newsmen To Tour U. S. Zone

FRANKFURT, Germany, Jan. 23 (AP)—A party of 11 Soviet newspapermen today began a 12-day tour of the American zone.  
 The Russian correspondents will visit American military government installations, German factories and displaced persons camps. They also will talk with German politicians, trade union heads and shop committees in Frankfurt, Heidelberg, Stuttgart, Munich, Nuernberg and other cities.  
 A party of American newspapermen has just completed a tour of the Russian zone of Germany.

## Housing Unit May Be Closed

Fifteen vacancies in the Mountain View public housing project at the end of Main street have led to consideration of de-activating that project, it was learned Thursday.  
 The housing committee of the chamber of commerce, after looking into the situation, has asked that action be deferred until it is learned for certain the housing cannot be filled.  
 The matter was referred to Winston Purvine, director of OVS, with a request that he determine if OVS students may want to occupy the vacancies in the project.  
 Housing committee men said that the vacancies reported at Mountain View do not fit into the picture of housing shortage here, and they want to give the community a chance to fill up the project.

## Four OSC Students Hurt In Wreck

DALLAS, Ore., Jan. 23 (AP)—Four Oregon College of Education students and two other persons were treated at a hospital here Wednesday night for injuries suffered in a head-on collision of two automobiles east of the city on the Pacific highway.  
 Polk county Sheriff's Deputy Tony Neufeldt said the two cars crashed at a sharp curve at the intersection of the highway and Orr's Corner road.  
 Injured in one car were George Warren Jones, severe head and facial bruises; Lewis Holt, leg fracture; Bill Somppi, possible shoulder fracture; and Wayne Lairman, cuts and bruises.  
 Charlene Meier and Ed Yeager, both Dallas, were in the second car. Yeager suffered a fractured nose and his companion minor cuts.

## Garage Blaze Rocks City

CHESTER, Pa., Jan. 23 (AP)—A \$500,000 fire set off 15 explosions in a huge Center City garage early Thursday, destroying 36 buses and causing 2000 persons to flee their homes as winds carried burning embers 1500 feet.  
 The general alarm blazed wrecked the garage of the Southern Pennsylvania Bus company and more than 200 firemen—including all from Chester's five companies—battled the oil-fed flames for an hour before bringing the blaze under control.  
 The damage estimate was made by firemen on the scene.
