OREGON'S new Governor John Hall has withstood his first test as the official who must pass final judgment on a prisoner sentenced to death in Oregon's gas chamber.

As is customary in these situations, the governor was put under terrific pressure from a large group of individuals and organizations. In this case, the executive was urged to exercise clemency chiefly by persons who claimed that the prisoner, Wardell Henderson, would not have been sentenced to death had he been a white man.

It is clear that only in the most extreme circumstances should the governor of the state step in to overturn the decision of a court of justice. To justify such a step, there must be a clear-cut miscarriage of justice, or the development of convincing new evidence subsequent to the trial.

If capital punishment is to be the law of the state, its mandates will most certainly be carried out on occasion by the state. Those who do not believe in it should work for its repeal in the law, rather than by attempting to repeal it by executive order.

Our Imperturbable Mr. Scott THE recent visit here of a squirmy, excited and noisy basketball coach emphasized, by contrast, the imperturbability of our own Wayne Scott.

We do not mean to censure the visitor, whose temper and emotions are his own business and not ours, but the amusing contrast was well worth observing as an entertainment feature of the game.

His demeanor created a sense of confidence in the cause of the Pelicans, and we think it has helped to win games for them. When it was all over, an acquaintance of ours remarked: "Wayne Scott really got worked up over that one, didn't he? I saw him cross his legs twice."

By GEORGE GALLUP Director, American Institute of Public Opinion PRINCETON, N. J., Jan. 23—Labor union members pick President Truman in preference to either Governor Thomas E. Dewey or Senator Robert A. Taft as their choice for president in 1948.



Henry A. Wallace receives the support of approximately one labor union member in ten in the poll. The candidate preferences of union labor have a vital bearing on the election not only because of the substantial number of votes involved but also because both the CIO and AF of L are planning to take an extremely active part in the 1948 campaign.

The Institute tested the present-day sentiment of union members by asking a cross-section how they would vote if three-cornered races were being held today involving Truman-Dewey-Wallace, Truman-Eisenhower-Wallace and Truman-Taft-Wallace.

ORGANIZED labor's prime interest in the 1948 race is said to be the defeat of members of congress who supported the Taft-Hartley act to regulate labor unions.

The World Today

"That was a shocking picture which British Foreign Secretary Bevin drew in the house of commons yesterday when he charged that Russia is bent on a ruthless drive to dominate the whole European continent and that one-power domination will inevitably lead to another World war."

It seems to me, that Washington's release of a Secretary Bevin's speech represent concerted action by the two major western powers. One object is to inform the world, not only the democracies but the peoples of the Russian sphere of domination, concerning the true state of affairs.

There are some here in high places who feel that such tactics can do no good and may do considerable harm. But most officials seem convinced that the time has come for unvarnished language.

There will be no after hours drinking. And the town will be closed up at night. While from gambling all must be shrinking. Or else all get locked up tight.

Lottery tickets shall be banned forever. Likewise all games of chance. Why, a guy's gonna have to be clever. To even find a place to dance.

It wasn't made clear just why the two reds should have protested this, in view of the fact that the bolsheviks have publicly proclaimed that they are out to defeat the Marshall plan.

Bevin also announced plans for a union of the nations of Western Europe to face the Russian drive for control of the whole continent. He declared that the time is ripe for the consolidation of Western Europe, and disclosed that Britain already has initiated talks with Belgium, the Netherlands and Luxembourg.

So it would seem that the mills of the western democracies are beginning to grind full speed.

Jean is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Albert V. McVey, Lakeshore drive, Klamath Falls.

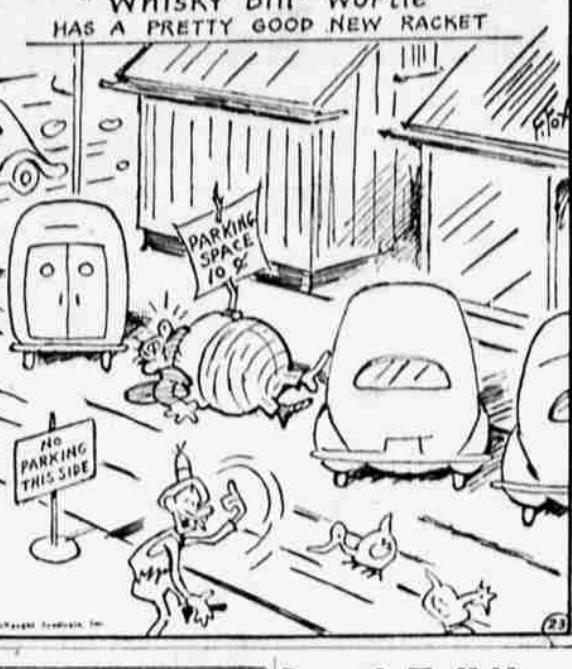

Death Toll Up In Holy Land

JERUSALEM, Jan. 23 (AP)—An Arab was killed by a sniper today on Palestine's coastal plain, and a Jew was reported slain in an attack on an Arab roadhouse on Jerusalem's outskirts.

The unofficial tally of violent deaths in the Holy Land rose to 263 since the United Nations voted November 29 to divide the country between Arabs and Jews.

The Jew was killed, Jewish sources said, in an attack on the roadhouse by Hagana, the Jewish agency's defense force. The cafe, which was blown up, was situated near where Arabs killed a Jew yesterday in an attack on a convoy.

The Arab sniper victim fell at Holon, south of Tel Aviv and Jaffa. In the borderland between Jewish Tel Aviv and Arab Jaffa, Jewish bombers blasted another house. Police said Jews were believed to have mined the whole area.
